Professor Will Speak At Chapel

Dr. Browne Barr, professor of preaching at the Divinity School of Yale University, will speak on "Storm-Tossed Community," at the University Chapel Service of Worship at 10:35 a.m. Sunday in Schwab Auditorium.

The Chapel Choir, directed by Wanda Taylor, will sing as anthem "Like as the Hart Desires," by Herbert Howells.

University Organist George E. Ceiza will play "Tranquillamente E Dolente" from "Three Liturgical Preludes" by Olroyd as Prelude; "Toccata" by Froberger as Postlude; and "Mite Ernest, O Menschenkinder" by Walcha as Offertory.

Barr holds degrees from Cornell College, Yale University, and has studied at Union Theological Seminary.

Barr joined the faculty of the Yale University Divinity School in 1951 as an associate professor of preaching and the parish ministry and was promoted to full professorship in 1957.

Barr has had extensive experience, first as an associate minister and then as a minister, in all types of pastoral responsibilities in small industrial and college towns. He is a member of the New Haven Association of Congregational Ministers and Church Congregational Ministers and Churches.

Religious Organizations Offer Special Activities to Students

The University Christian Association, the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation and the Newman Club offer special activities for students of the three major religious traditions.

The UCA represents students of the Protestant and Orthodox faiths. Through the year, the UCA plans worship services in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Meditation Chapel.

Several weekend retreats to the UCA Cabin are planned during the year. These give members the opportunity to become acquainted with each other and to discuss topics pertinent to their faith.

An informal reception and open house will be held from 3 to 5 p.m. Sunday in the main lounge of the chapel. At the reception, students may meet UCA cabinet officers and learn more about specific UCA activities.

Related to the UCA are approximately 11 denominational fellowships and foundations. These groups usually conduct weekly meetings on Sunday morning and evening, as well as study groups, worship services and classes throughout the week.

These include the Evangelical United Brethren Student Fellowship, the Free Methodist Student Fellowship, the United Student Fellowship, the Roger Williams Fellowship, the Christian Student Fellowship, the Eastern Orthodox Society, the William Penn Foundation, the Wesley Foundation, the Westminster University Fellowship, the Episcopal Student Group and the Lutheran Student Association.

Membership in the Christian Science Organization is open for students of the Christian Scientist faith. The group holds testimonial meetings at 7 p.m. each Thursday for all students and faculty.

For students of the Unitarian-Universalist faith, the Emerson Society holds weekly lectures and discussion periods.

The B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation serves students of the Jewish

tradition. Their program includes worshipping together on the Sabbath, Holy Days and Festivals.

Socials, a Purim Carnival, stunt nights, an Oneg Shabbat and an Israeli folk dance session are held also.

Hillel will be holding open house at 4 p.m. every day this week. There will also be a Sabbath Eve Service and reception at 8 tonight.

There will be a lox and bagel brunch at 11 a.m. Sunday with a freshman council organization meeting following at 12:15. For students of the Roman

Catholic Faith, the official organization on campus is the Newman Club.

Weekly masses are held each Sunday at 8, 9:30 and 11 a.m. in Our Lady of Victory Church and at 9 a.m. in Schwab Auditorium.

The group also participates in a choir, a weekly radio program, a newspaper, retreats, Communion breakfasts and weekly socials.

Bischoff Retires After 33 Years

Eugene C. Bischoff, professor of physical education, retired July 1, marking the completion of 33 years of continuous service. He has been conferred the title of professor emeritus of physical education.

Best known for his work in the field of intramural athletics, Bischoff has directed this program at the University since 1936.

Bischoff is known to many as "the father of Penn State's intramural program — the man who built it from scratch and nursed it along through the years to the position it now holds — the finest of its type in the country."

A native of Lorain, Ohio, Bischoff was educated in the public schools of Lorain, and in 1924 was graduated from Oberlin College with a bachelor of arts degree in physical education.
