

WRA Open House To Be Held Tonight

An Open House to be held tonight from 7 to 9 o'clock at White Hall will initiate the 1959-60 WRA program.

According to WRA president, Jean Nigh, the program is to be the first in a series of open houses which will comprise

the WRA's individual participation program. The Open House is the first part of the four-fold program in which all coeds are invited to participate.

During these open houses all the facilities of White Hall will be open to use. When the semester begins they will be held every Friday and Saturday night from 7 to 9 p.m.

The second portion of the WRA program is special projects. Under this heading comes the WRA Christmas party for underprivileged children and sports days. There are three sports days held each year in the fall, winter and spring. Teams from surrounding colleges are invited up to participate in the program. The fall sport to be played on Sports Day is field hockey.

The third major undertaking of the WRA is the sponsoring of a complete women's intramural program. This fall field hockey, volleyball and table tennis will be offered.

The WRA also sponsors a series of clubs for which coeds may try out. These clubs are swimming, modern dance, officials, bridge, golf, rifle, bowling, tennis, and field hockey.

Women may try out for these at the following times: bridge, 6:30 p.m., Sept. 24 in the playroom of White Hall; bowling, 7 p.m., Sept. 24 in the White Hall bowling alleys; modern dance, 7 p.m., Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 in the White Hall dance studios; golf, 3 p.m., Sept. 29 in 2 White Hall; field hockey, 4:30 p.m., Sept. 23 at Holmes Field; officials, 6:30, Sept. 24 in 2 White Hall; swimming, Sept. 21, 22 and 24 at the White Hall pool; and tennis, 6:30, Sept. 29 in the White Hall gym.
