

Encampment Report

Law Codifications Asked for Students

A codification of violations of student judicial rules and their punishments has been called for by the 1959 Student Encampment members.

The Student Conduct workshop recommended that the Assembly appoint a committee to do an operational analysis

of the present judicial system, and that the general principles on student conduct be developed through the student body and be re-evaluated annually.

This evaluation would be done with regard to the setting of policies for publicity of cases and offenders, and also to develop an understanding between students and the administration on policies concerning student conduct. A committee was also called for to decide the original and final areas of jurisdiction of student courts since it is not clear which agency decides a case.

These recommendations were formulated in light of the present vagueness of student codes of conduct so that the student body might have access to a statement of violations and standard punishments for each type of violation. The codification would be done in a brief, simple manner, and provision for change would be considered.

The workshop recommended that a study be made of student conduct in various types of living situations such as community living, areas of all freshmen, all upperclassmen and mixed areas.

The right of students 21 years of age or older to drink was asserted, but members asked for better enforcement of the state laws regarding the use and possession of alcoholic beverages on
