## Men Residents To Elect Heads Of Dorm Units

Students living in the West Halls and Murray Halls residences will elect unit officers today and tomorrow.

At the election meetings, a quorum shall consist of 50 per cent of the electors in the area. Nominations will be taken the first of a self-nominating process.

The presidents of each unit will in turn sit on the area council. Individual council officer elections are scheduled for Thursday and Monday.

The presidents of the West Halls and Murray Halls area councils were elected last spring. Officers of the area councils represent their respective areas on the board of governors of the Association of Independent Men.

No unit or council officer may serve as an AIM officer. Persons wishing to run for an AIM office should not run for a unit or council office since the two offices cannot be served simultaneously, according to Carl Smith, AIM elections chairman.

## Tickets To Be Available For Opera

Giuseppe Verdi's "Rigoletto" will be presented by the Goldovsky Grand Opera Theater at 8 p.m. Sunday in Recreation Hall.

Student tickets will be available for the Artists Series program at 1 p.m. today at the Student Union desk. Non-student tickets will go on sale at 9 a.m. tomorrow for \$2.25.

The Goldovsky company is composed of 35 members, including 15 principal singers, 10 musicians, a chorus of eight, two dancers, a conductor and a staging staff. This is the fifth cross-country tour that Boris Goldovsky and his company have made.

"Rigoletto" is one of the most well-known operas that Verdi has written. Goldovsky translated the opera from the Italian to the English, with the help of Sarah Caldwell, as the plot will be clearly understandable.

"Rigoletto" was written 145 years ago for the Venice Opera and first appeared on the American stage in New York in 1877. In 1945 Enrico Caruso made his American debut in "Rigoletto."

Goldovsky started his theater in 1944 as the New England Opera Theater in Boston. He has directed 31 operas in his home city and has toured more than 20 states.

The company includes the old favorites such as "Rigoletto," "The Marriage of Figaro," "Carmen," "La Boheme" and "Don Giovanni" as well as lesser known operas in its repertoire.

might as a remedy to the present inadequacies in the University's grading system. These inadequacies, members felt, are a symptom of the underlying problem of inaccurate methods of evaluating student achievement in courses offered by the University.

The elimination of percentage equivalents to letter grades was approved in order to clear up misunderstanding on the part of both students and faculty members as to the University's Grading Policy.

This reference to the problem of close cuts, the working has recommended that attendance requirements be related to previous semester academic achievement. That was done to further the student's responsibility for his own education.

A University-wide Honor Program was urged in place of the departmental honor programs.

Required comprehensive examinations in the students' major field as requirement for the baccalaureate degree have also been recommended.

The committee asked that greater emphasis be placed on the academic aspects of University Education as future Encampments in order to encourage and create better intellectual atmosphere and to derive educational responsibility and independent study among students.

(Continued from page one) break in the direct communication line between the administration and the Assembly, Pearson said.

Expressing another point of view, Byers said that the chairing of the Assembly is a "doggy job." If the president were not bogged down with parliamentary procedure, he could see issues more clearly, Byers said.

Pearson said "not all that goes on in Assembly goes on in the debate and only the chairman of the Assembly knows all that is going on." He said that the vice president now knows more about the issue in the Assembly than the president on whom the administration calls to find out about Assembly action.

Mary Ann Garter, Assembly member, arguing that the SGA president should chair the Assembly because he loses prestige if he does not, said that usually the vice presidency is more or less nominal and the SGA Constitution as it stands now has made the presidency nominal.

To this argument, Byers answered "we aren't electing a showboat."

Byers, referring to a clause which limits the debating power of the president on the Assembly floor, said that this was to cut his power and to give him chairmanship of the Assembly was to give him more power.

Miss Garter said that his debating power would be limited because he would have to step down from the chair to speak.
