

# Turkey, Poland Vie for Seat

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Turkey and Communist Poland deadlocked yesterday in a race for a seat on the UN Security Council. At stake was the prestige of the United States, the principal supporter of Turkey.

Poland held an edge but failed to win the required two-thirds majority in a series of secret ballots in the 82-nation UN General Assembly. More voting will take place today.

# Venezuelans Smash New Conspiracy

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — The government announced yesterday it has smashed a revolutionary conspiracy against President Romulo Betancourt, and 40 persons are under arrest. More arrests are expected.

Ramon Velazquez, Betancourt's secretary, said the plotters were followers of deposed dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez, who is living in exile in Miami Beach, Fla.

Velazquez said the plotters planned to assassinate Betancourt; Vice President Raul Leon; Adm. Carlos Larrazabal, navy chief; and Gen. Carlos Luis Araque, commander of the National Guard. The guard is Venezuela's national police system.

A series of bombings in Caracas was connected with the plot, officials said. Four small bombs exploded in Caracas Friday. Another exploded Sunday at a warehouse owned by Eugenio Mendoza, one of Venezuela's leading industrialists, and still another in front of the home of the brother-in-law of Miguel Angel Canille, Caracas newspaper publisher.

A bomb exploded yesterday morning at the studios of the Cultural radio station.

The bombs were small and caused only minor damage. Officials said the purpose of the bombings was to create a state of tension.

Officials quoted some of those under arrest as saying they had a promise from Gen. Rafael Trujillo, Dominican Republic dictator, to simulate an invasion of Venezuela to further the plotters' campaign.

Police investigations said the Luis Eduardo Chataing, government controller during the Perez Jimenez regime.

## Prexy Urges Fuller Forestry Education

BEDFORD, Pa. (AP) — Dr. Eric A. Walker, president of the University urged a more rounded education for foresters yesterday. Speaking at the 84th annual meeting of the American Forestry Association, Dr. Walker suggested a seven-year course of study instead of the present four. He said more emphasis should be placed on the human aspects of forestry, adding: "America cannot afford waste. The time has come . . . to develop a multi-tiered system of forestry education that will permit each student to develop to the full level of his potential."

# Burglars Steal Record Amount In England

LONDON (AP) — A daring gang of burglars made a grand tour of four fashionable jewelry stores during the weekend and vanished with a record haul of gems. Scotland Yard searched London's underworld for clues.

Detectives and store officials said at least half a million dollars worth of jewelry was stolen and that the total may reach 1 1/2 million.

Police theorized it was an inside job. The burglars worked systematically through all four shops of the Goldsmiths & Silversmiths Association chain in London's West End as if they knew their way around.

Detectives swept on known fences, and posted a watch on docks and airports.

The burglars had keys and used no violence to get in. No one saw or heard them.

Employees suspected nothing as they opened up the shutters yesterday. They found empty jewelry cases scattered around and the stock gone.

# Lawrence Backs Economic Study

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A study of the potential economic impact of national disarmament was suggested yesterday by Gov. David L. Lawrence.

The governor proposed formation of a federal-state-local government committee. This committee would make plans for the period of economic change following any large scale cutback in the defense spending.

Lawrence noted that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev advanced a proposal for world disarmament during his recent tour of the United States. The governor also pointed out that the topic is on the United Nations agenda.
