Phi Beta Kappa Alters Requirements

Minimum requirements for election to membership in Lambda of Pennsylvania chapter of Phi Beta Kappa have been revised, Dr. Hugh H. Chapman, chapter president, said today.

Eligible seniors must have been in residence at least two years by the end of the second semester of the senior year, must have an average of 3.50 or better on work at the University, and must also meet other requirements as follows:

- Their program of study must have been liberal in character, which means that at least 80 per cent of the required credits for graduation, exclusive of ROTC and physical education courses, have been in the subject matter groups of biological sciences; physical sciences; social sciences; humanities; mathematics; English language and literature; foreign languages; and the arts.
- The senior must also have passed or be enrolled in at least the fourth semester course of one foreign language and at least six credits each from five of the other seven subject matters specified. Foreign language requirements may be met by a proficiency test also.
- No senior shall be eligible if his major is not in one of the eight subject-matter fields identified above or if his four-year course program includes more than 42 semester hours of "required" work in one department.
- The requirements also limit the number elected to membership to not more than 10 per cent of those expected to receive liberal bachelor's degrees.
