

Janjigian To Crown Mardi King

Every year there are many queens at the University, but the only king of the year will be crowned at the Mardi Brawl which will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday in the Hetzel Union ballroom.

At Mardi Brawl, the jam session sponsored by Chimes, junior women's hat society, the five finalists for Mardi Gras king will put on a talent show and the winner will be crowned king by Jessie Janjigian, one of the judges of the talent show.

Jazz music will be provided by the Don Grebb's Combo and by the Four Dimensions. Admission is 50 cents.

Vincent Marino, master of ceremonies, will present trophies to the best booth and best closed show of the Friday night Mardi Gras.

Trophy winners will be determined on a point system given for winning ribbons at Mardi Gras and also how many tickets the booth or closed show takes in.

Portable radios will be set up to broadcast the Penn State-West Virginia football game for those who wish to hear it.

The five king finalists will be chosen by penny voting at the Mardi Gras Friday night. Robert McCracken, master of ceremonies, will introduce each king candidate.

Boths and open shows will be presented with ribbons at Mardi Gras. First, second and third place ribbons will be awarded for originality, workmanship, and appearance.

Alpha Phi Omega, men's service fraternity and Skull and Bones, senior men's hat society, will help each women's group construct their booths at 5 p.m. Friday.

Mardi Gras is being sponsored by Scollis, senior women's hat society.

Grads Offered Summer Grants

Former teaching assistants may now apply at the Graduate School Office for 1960 summer fellowships to be awarded by the National Science Foundation.

The deadline for applications is Dec. 11.

Students must have had not less than one academic year of teaching experience (at least eight hours per week) at the University to be eligible.

The teaching experience is considered as teaching, laboratory instruction, grading of papers, and other duties related to teaching responsibilities for which the student is paid regularly by the University.

The summer fellowships may be held for 8 to 12 weeks and the recipient will receive a stipend of \$50 to \$75 per week while the Foundation pays his tuition.
