

# Frost to Broadcast On WDFM, WMAJ

Both radio stations WDFM and WMAJ will broadcast the Robert Frost poetic reading program at 8:30 p.m. tomorrow.

The program will be held in Schwab Auditorium. Frost will recite selections from his writings.

The possibilities of having Frost appear over television circuits or in Recreation Hall were ruled out after discussing the matter with Mrs. Kathleen Morrison, Frost's niece and manager of his tour. Mrs. Nina Brown, chairman of the Artists' Series, said.

The Artists' Series Committee had hoped to hold a performance on Sunday afternoon. Frost's physicians said that due to the cold Frost has, an addi-

tional reading would be physically impossible.

The 238 non-student tickets for the Frost program were sold within 20 minutes yesterday morning to earlybirds who braved the lines at the Hetzel Union desk.

William Fuller, manager of the HUB, said that by 8:15 a.m. there were more students in line than there were tickets available. The ticket booth opened early so that no more students than necessary would wait in line only to be turned away when the tickets were gone.

What can the college do to stem this trend?

One possible solution—and this is not foreseen in the immediate future—is a change of name. It is hoped this might remove the unfavorable impression caused by the title Home Economics.

But, the best possible solution to the problem seems to lie in research. The college is already known throughout the

country for its research facilities and for the faculty.

Dennis said the extension to the Home Economics South building is expected to aid the college in obtaining more research grants and hence more graduate students to take part in the projects. It is hoped this in turn will attract more undergraduates.

The college's faculty — short-staffed in the past—is now getting out from under the pile. They have been able to devote more time to research.
