

# Senate Regulations May Be Revised

Student Government Association President Leonard Julius told the SGA Assembly Thursday night that the Senate Regulations pertaining to conduct of students, student activities and student social organizations would be revised.

Julius said the University Senate Committee on Student Affairs, of which he is an ex-officio member, will recommend to the Senate that the W, Y and Z sections of the regulations be revamped as broad, general rules.

Dean of Women Dorothy J. Lipp and Dean of Men Frank J. Simes will re-write the regulations, Julius said.

He explained that the dean of women and the dean of men on this campus and a student-administrative committee on each of the Commonwealth Campuses would be responsible for interpreting the new broad rules.

Their interpretation and policies will be published, he added. The main reason for the revision, Julius said, was that many specific rules are included which

pertain only to students on the main campus. Since the Senate Regulations are used on all campuses, general rules would form a base on which each campus could build its own rules.

In other business, the SGA Assembly approved the following executive appointments:

Sharon Hoffman and Robert Umpstead, co-chairmen of Elections Committee (as interim appointees until next semester); and James Ettleson and Henrietta Harris, co-chairmen of Orientation Week.

Legislative appointments which were approved are Dorothy Lewis and Robert Carlson, Commonwealth Campuses Integration Committee; and Richard Hammond, Gail Bentley and John Huddart, Social - Recreational Committee.

# Columbia's Journ Dean To Speak at LA Lecture

Dr. Edward W. Barrett, dean of the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism, will be the second speaker for the Liberal Arts Lecture Series planned for 8 p.m. Monday in 121 Sparks.

The subject of his lecture, which is co-sponsored by the School of Journalism, will be "International Persuasion."

Barrett was editorial director of "Newsweek" magazine from 1946 to 1950. During this time he was also in charge of organizational matters, production mechanism, public relations and radio-television programming.

Before this, "Newsweek" em-

ployed him as a Washington correspondent, National Affairs editor and associate editor. Barrett was also assistant editor of "Today" magazine.

During World War II he served as director of the Office of War Information. He was also acting deputy chief for Psychological Warfare.

Barrett received a bachelor of arts degree with honors from Princeton University in 1932 and a doctor of laws degree from Bard College in 1950.

He has been dean of the Columbia Graduate School of Journalism since 1956.

Barrett will also speak at the 50th anniversary banquet of Sigma Delta Chi, men's professional journalism fraternity.
