265 Pints of Blood Donated To Red Cross

Two hundred and sixty-five pints of blood were donated at the Red Cross Bloodmobile canteen which was located in the Hetzel Union cardroom for the past two days.

Out of 128 students scheduled to donate yesterday, 95 appeared, and there were 54 walk-ins. Seven people were rejected because of medical reasons, making the amount of blood given yesterday, 142 pints. There were 123 pints donated on Wednesday.

Loren D. Tukey, vice chairman of the State College chapter of the bloodmobile drive, said that the total of pints contributed was not as high as it has been in previous years. He said that the decrease in donations this year was probably due to the number of students who have colds and other illnesses.


