## Gill to Discuss Bible at Chapel

Dr. Theodore A. Gill, president of the San Francisco Theological Seminary, will speak at the University Chapel service of worship at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

"Back to the Bible," is the title of his sermon, which is the first in a series of two on the subject of "Christian Cliches."

As choral introit, the Chapel Choir, under the direction of Wila Taylor, will sing "O Lord of Hosts, All Heaven Possessing" by Bach. Excerpts from Psalm 90, arranged by Vaughn Williams, will be offered as the morning anthem.

University organist, George E. Ceiga, will play as the prelude "Canzona" by Gabrieli; Chorale "Wir Glauden All'en Einen Gott" by Scheidt as the offertory; "Tocata-Dorian Mode" by Froberger as postlude.

Gill became president of San Francisco Theological Seminary in 1958. From 1958 until that time he was editor of "The Pulpit" and managing editor of "The Christian Century."

Gill is a member of the Permanent Committee on the Book of Common Worship, of the Faith and Order Study Commission for North America Conference and the Haddam House Editorial Advisory Committee.

## 24 Grads to Study Counseling Work

The University is training 24 graduate students to become rehabilitation counselors in public and private rehabilitation agencies.

Many of these students will enter employment under Civil Service when they receive their master's degree. Their program, with the passing of the Civil Service Examination, will qualify them to work in rehabilitation counseling in Pennsylvania.

The two-year program, under the direction of Dr. Kenneth W. Hylbert, includes formal courses in education, psychology and social work. In addition, the students serve as interns in supervised field work in rehabilitation counseling.
