Council Offers Scholarships

Applications are now available for the two sophomore scholarships given by the Engineering-Architect Student Council.

The scholarships amount to \$240 each and the recipient will receive it on the basis of his academic standing, need, character and extracurricular activities. Applications must be returned to Dean Lawrence J. Perez's office by December 4.

Five council members were ruled ineligible to hold their office because their averages fall below an All-U of 2.2. Plans for the election or appointment of new members to take their place were referred to the Elections Committee.

Perez announced that a Thermofax machine which can copy pages from books is being purchased for the use of engineering and architecture students to aid them in doing research.

This machine will be placed in the Engineering Library in Sackett in the middle of December.

According to Moore, the courses the student is most interested in, his hobbies, and whether he may or may not hold elective offices in his activities will indicate what type of work he is most suited for.

Moore is interviewing students today and tomorrow for positions with IBM.

The student's work experience is valuable. "But," Moore said, "we are also interested in his initiative in getting the job." Did one of his relatives just hand it to him or did he pound the streets hunting for it?

Some knowledge of the company is expected of the student who is to be interviewed. The representatives of IBM feel that if the student is interested enough to want an interview, he should inform himself by reading some of the advance literature put out by the company.
