# Collegian Wins Sports Prize

The Daily Collegian won first place in the sports writing contest sponsored by Sigma Delta Chi, men's professional journalistic fraternity.

Five winning stories from the 1958-59 school year were entered in competition with 70 undergraduate chapters. The Collegian also submitted entries in the news, editorial, and feature writing contests.

The award was presented to William Jaffe, University chapter president, who attended SDX's national convention last week in Indianapolis, Ind.

H. Eugene Goodwin, director of the School of Journalism, was elected to the national executive council of the fraternity. The undergraduate chapter placed 15th in the Beckman Chapter Efficiency contest and eighth in the Holgate Professional Achievement Award.

William Diebler, chapter treasurer, and John Vairo, instructor in journalism and chapter adviser, also attended the four-day convention.

# 2 Students Involved In Accidents

Two University students were involved in automobile accidents over the weekend with total damages amounting to \$1400.

Richard Harker, senior in civil engineering from Philadelphia, was traveling north on S. Pugh St., at 2:05 a.m. Sunday when his car went out of control.

The auto struck a parked 1959 Porsche sedan and continued over the curb and damaged some shrubbery on a front lawn.

The Porsche, owned by David R. Cooper, received approximately \$900 in damage. Harker's auto received \$200 in damage.

Harker was not injured.

In another auto accident, Robert Comly, senior in civil engineering from Fleming, skidded and overturned while attempting to pass another car on the Benner Pike.

# English Prof to Speak To Belles Lettres Club

Samuel F. Bayard, associate professor of English, will speak to the Belles Lettres Club at 7 tonight in Simmons Lounge on the topic, "Collecting Ballads in Pennsylvania."

Bayard, an internationally known folklorist, will tell of his field experiences in locating ballads, his techniques in inducing old folks to sing them, and his devices for recording, classifying and preserving the words and tunes.

Steinberg has been directing the Pittsburgh Symphony since 1952. In 1958, he became the director of the London Philharmonic. In addition to these responsibilities he has been the guest conductor for several leading orchestras.

The Pittsburgh Symphony was first organized in the early 1900's but was discontinued during World War I. In 1926, a group of theater musicians started the symphony again, buying music with their own money.

By 1937, the symphony was well-established in the community and it had aided in disposing of the "blue laws" which prohibited the sale of concert tickets on Sunday.

In 1948 the Pittsburgh Symphony, under the direction of Fritz Reiner, received world acclaim.

The symphony includes 89 musicians, two conductors, a librarian, stage manager and an administrative staff. The group, which tours 27 weeks out of the year, travels in two buses, one for smokers and one for non-smokers.

Nunzio J. Palladino and Forrest J. Remick, professors of nuclear engineering, attended the meeting.

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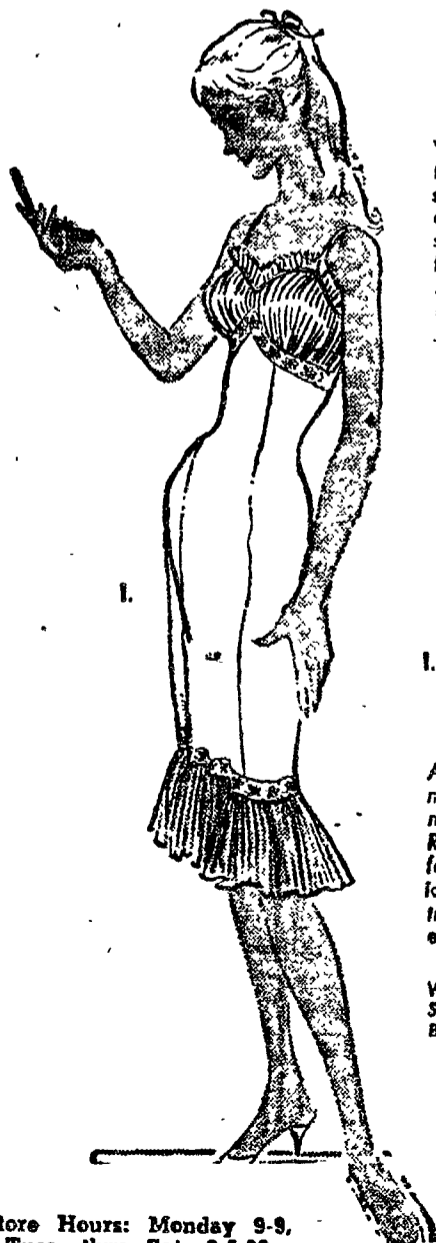


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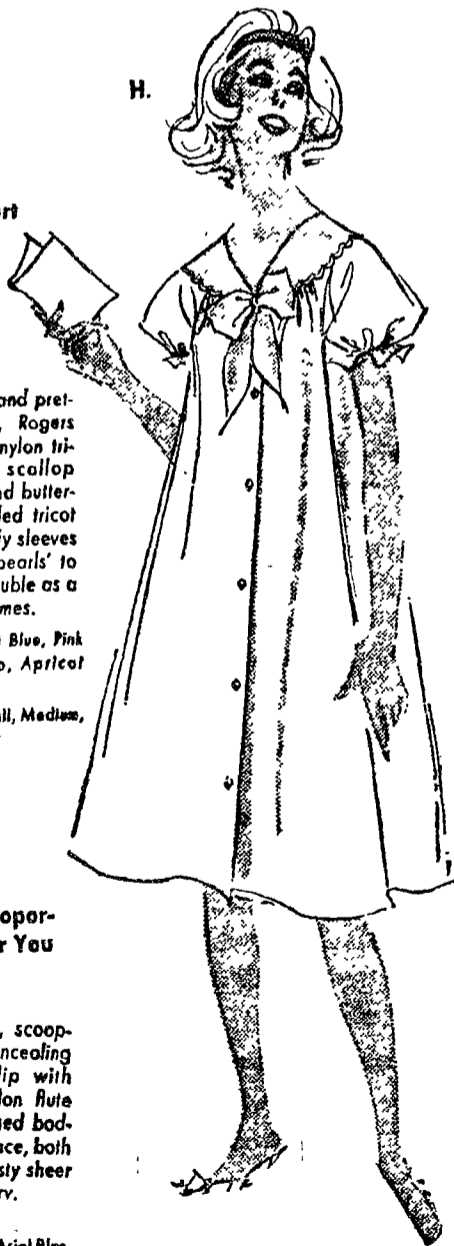
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
