

Steinberg to Conduct Myers' Talk Concert at Rec Hall Will Open Art Exhibit

Less than 200 student tickets and 30 non-student tickets remain for the Pittsburgh Symphony concert which will be held at 8 p.m. tomorrow in Recreation Hall.

This is the eighth Artist Series program of the 1959-60 season.

The program will include Symphony No. 4 in E flat

Major ("Romantic"), Sonata Piano Forte for Two Instrumental Chorus by Gabriele and Symphony No. 8 in F major, Opus 93, by Beethoven

Students have been requested by the Artists Series committee not to save seats since a large audience is expected.

William Steinberg, conductor of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, was born in Cologne, Germany. His musical talents cover an even wider range than conducting. At age 10 he was an accomplished violinist, at 15 a pianist, and at 19 a prize-winning conductor.

In his early years, Steinberg became a well-travelled man. He went all over Europe appearing

with numerous orchestras. In 1936 he went to Palestine where he reorganized the Palestine Symphony.

It was here that Arturo Toscanini, also a prominent conductor, first met Steinberg. He was so impressed with his musical ability that he invited Steinberg to the United States to direct the NBC Symphony.

After appearing with several orchestras all over the country, Steinberg signed a contract with the Pittsburgh Symphony in 1952.

The orchestra has had a long history, dating from 1896, when it was conducted by Victor Herbert, famous American composer.

The Pittsburgh Symphony has appeared in several cities in the country and has been called one of the greatest orchestras of the United States. The orchestra also gives two series of concerts annually for children.

Malcolm Myers, associate professor of art at the University of Minnesota, will speak at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow in the Hetzel Union gallery. He will open the HUB's fourth art exhibit "Eleven American Print-makers."
