# IM Boxing Opens with Laman, Walter, Hillwig, Kiess Victors

Intramural boxing came off the ropes last evening as four budding pugilists fought their way to victory and six others won forfeits in the first round of competition.

The tournament, which will be completed before Christmas vacation, schedules bouts in eight weight classes, from the 126-pound class to the unlimited class. All matches are fought in Rec Hall beginning daily at 5 p.m. The finals will be held on Dec. 16.

All action last night was in the fraternity division. The winners in the four matches were Bill Laman of Sigma Nu, Jim Walter of Alpha Sigma Phi, Bill Hillwig of Delta Upsilon, and Dean Kiess of Phi Delta Theta. In the first match of the season

Hillwig had too much power for Warren Hullof of Phi Kappa Sigma as he shot rights and lefts to the head. Hillwig, who fought out of a southpaw stance, staggered Hullof twice in the third round, causing the fight to be stopped.

Laman and Edward Roberts, Phi Sigma Kappa, battled head to head and toe to toe for three rounds with Laman copping the split decision. Both boys displayed little defense in the free-wheeling brawl. Each fighter had his moments as both were jolted with jabs to the head.

Throwing rights and lefts to the heart and chin, Kiess staved off a second round rally by Bill Leary to win a unanimous decision in the 158-pound class.

Leary, who flashed a good left jab, threw the best combination of the evening with a stiff right followed by a crushing uppercut

in the second round, but it was not enough to spell off the points Kiess had accumulated with his two-fisted attack.

Walter displayed the best style and poise of the night as he won a unanimous verdict over Jeffrey Foster in the 135-pound class. Walter played the waiting, back-peddling game while picking off Foster jabs and counter punching.

# Engelbrink Will Receive All-American Nomination

Penn State cross country captain Dick Engelbrink, who finished seventh in the NCAA championships at East Lansing, Michigan, last week, will be named to the All-American cross country team by the National Collegiate Cross Country Coaches Association, Lion coach Chick Werner revealed last night.

This award will be given to Engelbrink for his third place performance at the IC4A's and his run in the Nationals, according to Werner.

Among the other harriers who received the coveted honor were Fordy Kennedy of Michigan State and Al Lawrence of Hou-

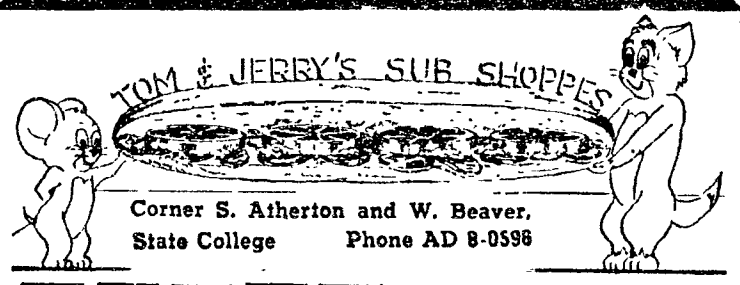
ston for his performance in the mile run last spring.

In the nationals, "the Eagle" led the Lion hill-and-dalers to a respectable tenth place in team scoring. He finished in seventh position behind Lawrence, Jon Macy of Houston, Kennedy, Bill Reynolds of the Spartans, Tom O'Riordan of Idaho State, and Billy Mills of Kansas.

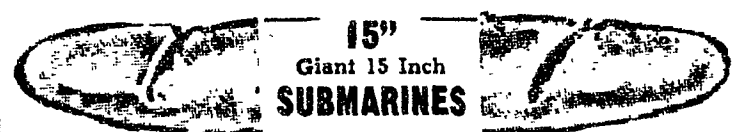
Other Lions who placed were Herm Weber, 28th; Steve Moorhead, 69th; Denny Johnson, 78th; and Mike Miller, 106th.

Weber was named captain-elect of next year's harrier squad at the annual cross country banquet last night. The junior harrier has been consistent as the number two man on the squad. He registered a first, two seconds, a fifth and tenth in dual meet competition this fall. In the IC4A's, Weber took 17th place.

Coach Werner also recommended nine men for varsity letters. They are Engelbrink, George Jones, Johnson, Chick King, Miller, Moorhead, Weber, Jack Williams and Walt Cottom, manager.
