

Indian Librarian Calls Open Stacks Beneficial

Open stacks help fulfill a university library's purpose of serving the students well, according to Shiva Narain Mathur, an Indian librarian.

"Books are meant to be used, not just preserved," Mathur said. "It is good," he added, "if students can go to the shelves and browse over them."

Mathur visited the Fred Lewis Pattee Library for two weeks through the efforts of the Inter-National Relations Committee of the American Library Association.

He is the assistant librarian at Rajasthan University in Jaipur, where he supervises technical and administrative work. When he returns to India in March, he will help train librarians for newly established village libraries.

"Our province," Mathur said, "is not fully developed, so I am especially interested in starting a school of library science."

While visiting libraries throughout the eastern United States since his arrival in October, Mathur has seen many mechanical devices he would like to use in his new library.

"Since India is so undeveloped,

he said, "we must use our money for things more useful to the whole country, such as industry." As soon as possible, however, Mathur would like to introduce these mechanical aids in India.

In commenting on books, Mathur said that best sellers are not confined to one country. "Dr. Zhivago," for example, has been quite popular at his library.

According to Mathur, India uses the colon system, a newer, "more scientific and analytical classifying method" developed by Dr. Ranganathan, an Indian pioneer in library work. It is more practical because it can be expanded to meet the needs of the native language.

This method solves many of the problems encountered when Indians use either the Dewey Decimal or Library of Congress systems.

"Our purpose is to serve students well and the colon system is best for us. It would be too expensive to switch an older library to it."

Birch to Give Speech About Earth's Interior

Dr. Francis Birch, professor of geology at Harvard University, will discuss "The Deep Interior of the Earth: Mantle and Core" in a public lecture scheduled for 8 p.m. Monday in the Mineral Science auditorium.

He is serving during December as distinguished visiting professor of geophysics at the University. A series of talks have been arranged for Birch and he will address the Mineral Industries Colloquium at 4:15 p.m. Friday. He will also present a series of four seminars on research problems in the earth sciences.

Birch received his bachelor of science, master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees from Harvard University, where he has been a member of the faculty since 1931.

Recipient of the Arthur L. Day Medal of the Geological Society of America in 1950, Birch was elected last month to the top honor of William Bowie Medalist of the American Geophysical Union.
