# Ed College Reorganizes Curriculum

The curriculum in education, which currently enrolls more than 1600 students, has been reorganized into the three curriculums of elementary and kindergarten education; secondary education; and rehabilitation education.

Dr. John R. Rackley, dean of the College of Education, said that the reorganization involves the changing of three majors of the present curriculum of education into three curriculums.

"There is no change in objectives, entrance requirements, graduation requirements, nor in the programs themselves," Rackley said.

Students preparing to become kindergarten or elementary school teachers will be enrolled in the new curriculum of elementary and kindergarten education, while those preparing for secondary school teaching positions, including those entering the field of business education, will be enrolled in the curriculum of secondary education.

The third new curriculum, rehabilitation education, is designed for students preparing for work as teachers or supervisors in rehabilitation programs for the handicapped.

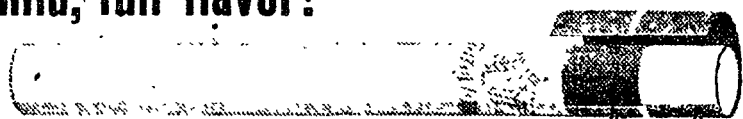
