

Heavyweights, Clayton Score Convincing IM Boxing Wins

Ted Steinman and Henry Marino, both fighting in the unlimited weight classification, and Sam Clayton, a lightning-fast 142-pounder, thrilled a Rec Hall crowd of more than 150 people with convincing wins in IM boxing matches last night.

Steinman, Zeta Beta Tau, stormed out of his corner and charged right into his heavier foe, Bill Simon of Delta Upsilon, with both fists flying. Simon put up a valiant effort throughout the fight, but couldn't cope with Steinman's superior speed. It was toe to toe all the way with Steinman emerging victorious by virtue of landing more blows than his lumbering opponent.

Marino, an independent, completely dominated the action in his fight against Al Morgan. Marino used his weight to good advantage in the clinches by leaning on his lighter adversary, and stunned Morgan several times with hard right crosses. A hard left to Morgan's head just before the bell caused the referee to stop the fight at the end of the first round.

Clayton, matched against Marlin Ebert, proved that he knows his way around the squared arena by administering a sound beating to his outclassed opponent. The bout was stopped in the middle

of the second round after a quick Clayton combination had sent Ebert reeling across the ring.

In a match between two stand-up style boxers Terry Snyder de-



feated Dave Hopwod when the bout was stopped in the second round. The first round was even; but in the second stanza, Snyder scored repeatedly with crisp combinations and had Hopwod groggy when the match was halted.

Richard Greenleaf, Delta Upsilon, decisioned Lorenzo Corsi of Alpha Phi Delta in a match of 128-pounders. Corsi looked good in the early action as he scored well with a stiff left jab, but Greenleaf started backtracking and using his greater reach to counter-punch to the win.

In 167-pound matches, Al Kuosman defeated Gerald Carp in one of the closest bouts of the night and Ron Avery overcame an early flurry by Bernie Buhl to post a decisive win over his light-footed foe.

Two fraternity 158-pound bouts

provided plenty of action and two close decisions. Dick Swenson of Sigma Chi used his longer reach to fend off the wild rushes of Delta Chi's Don Landis and scored repeatedly with sharp counter-punching. Bill Russ, one of Phi Psi's fine corps of boxers, decisioned John Marshall of Sigma Nu by dancing in and out and scoring with flurries.

The heavy card also featured two bouts between 135-pounders. In the fraternity division, Bill Laman of Sigma Nu won a unanimous decision over Jim Walter of Alpha Sigma Phi. Laman controlled the action throughout the fight and stunned his taller opponent several times with vicious left hooks.

In the 135-pound independent bout, Bill Hunt won a unanimous decision over Dave Frick.

Colts Will Meet LA Rams For Western Title Clincher

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The national football spotlight centers on Los Angeles today when the champion Baltimore Colts seek to sew up the Western Division title of the National Football League.

Quarterback Johnny Unitas and his mates are 12-point favorites to defeat the luckless Los Angeles Rams and send the Colts into the championship battle with the New York Giants for the second straight year.

The Colts have not beaten the Rams in Memorial Coliseum since 1954, and only once since 1950.

Despite the Rams' poorest season ever in Los Angeles, nine losses and only two wins, a crowd of around 60,000 is expected.

The game, final of the regular season, will be nationally tele-

vised (CBS). The kickoff is set for 4:35 p.m. EST.

Baltimore must win. Otherwise, they have to contend in a playoff with the San Francisco 49ers or the Chicago Bears or both.

The Colts have an 8-3 record. Tied just behind are the Bears and 49ers with 7-4 records.

Tomorrow's slate of games includes Green Bay at San Francisco and Detroit at Chicago.

New York already has won the Eastern Division title and closes out the regular campaign tomorrow against the Redskins at Washington.

The remainder of the schedule: Cleveland Browns at Philadelphia, and Chicago Cardinals at Pittsburgh.

Los Angeles lost to Baltimore back East Nov. 29, 35-21. Forced to use some of his players at unaccustomed positions, due to injuries, the Rams did play an excellent second half.
