

'Bama Has Light But Power Packed Line

Into the Valley of Death rode seven football teams. The charge of Alabama's light brigade was just too much for them.

The 'Bama brigade, a group of seven hale and hearty linemen, was one of the main reasons Bear Bryant's Crimson Tide managed to finish the season with a 7-1-2 record and a Liberty Bowl date with Penn State in Philadelphia, Dec. 19.

Bryant's forward wall has to be one of the lightest in the country, weighing just 207 pounds per man.

Despite giving up almost 20 pounds per man against most opponents, Alabama still had one of the best defensive crews in the country.

The gentlemen from Tuscaloosa held their opponents to just 134 yards rushing and 45 yards passing in ten games. Their pass defense was the second best in the country.

Penn State coach Rip Engle isn't too happy about meeting up with Bryant's defensive minded southerner.

After watching game movies of the Crimson Tide, Engle had one word for Bryant's "pooch little ole linemen."

"They're fabulous," said Engle. "They're very fast and very

mobile like all southern football teams.

"That boy Cochran (Don Cochran 'Bama guard) is a real fine ballplayer and so is that Gary Phillips, Alabama tackle."

Cochran, a 200-pound senior from Birmingham, bolsters the middle of the Alabama line. He was voted 'Bama's top defensive ballplayer last year and is in on most of the plays.

Phillips (186), will be the lightest lineman on the field when the two teams square off Saturday. Phillips was a guard last year and was moved to tackle this year.

He's used to giving up 50 pounds to opposing linemen and he'll do just that when he comes up against Charley Janette Saturday.

The right tackle, Billy Neighbors, is the extreme opposite. He's 'Bama's heaviest lineman, weighing 222 pounds.

Neighbors is only a sophomore and earned his starting position early in the season. He was named to the Southeastern Conference sophomore all-star team for his play this year.

Alabama's other guard is a 203 pound senior, Bill Hannah. He is a two-year letterman, noted for his tough tackling and vicious blocking.

Jim Blevins a 213 pounder is the center. Blevins came along late in the year to become the leader of the team. He had to overcome two painful knee injuries before achieving first string status.

Blevins also is a two-year letterman and will play in the Blue-Gray game with Cochran and halfback Marlin Dyess.

Two sophomore speedsters, Tommy Brooker and Bill Rice are the Alabama wingmen. Both are big, strong and fast.

Brooker led all the vote getters for the SEC sophomore team this year. He caught seven passes for 108 yards and one touchdown.

Rice started opposite Brooker all year and is big and reckless. He only caught one pass all year but it was for a touchdown.

GRID NOTES—Penn State will meet its fifth inter-sectional opponent when it faces Alabama in the Liberty Bowl . . . The Lions did well in their other inter-sectional games, beating Missouri, 19-8, V.M.I. 21-0, Illinois, 20-9, and West Virginia, 28-10 . . . Basically a winged-T team Penn State attacks from what may be described as a T with variations . . . the Lions used the winged-T with flankers, spread formations, double slot, split ends and many other offensive sets.
