

# Cagers Take One, Drop Two; Play Carnegie Tech Tonight

There were no tournament trophies for John Egli and his Lion cagers this year, but a third place finish in the Keystone Classic could very well mark the turning point in the Lion season.

After losing to Colgate, 69-67, Dec. 19 and Temple, 60-50, in the first round of the Harrisburg tournament last week, the Lions bounced back to beat a tough Duquesne team, 72-69.

Mark DuMars, as usual, was in great form but the play of Gene Harris and Paul Sweetland turned out to be the difference between victory and defeat in the consolation game.

Tonight the Lions take another step on the comeback trail when they play Carnegie Tech's twice-beaten Tartans in Pittsburgh.

State now has a 2-5 record following the three games during the Christmas recess.

Colgate's win over the Lions marked the first time the Red Raiders beat an Egli-coached team. Wally Colender was high man for State with 20 points while DuMars was right behind with 16.

The Colgate game was the only time this season that DuMars scored less than 20 points.

The little magician took high point honors in the Keystone Classic with 45 points. He had 20 in the Temple loss and 25 points in the consolation game against the Dukes.

The duel which was expected between DuMars and Temple's Pickles Kennedy never really materialized as the Lions used their zone defense while Bruce Drysdale guarded DuMars for the tournament champs.

The Lion-Temple affair was close all the way with the Owls breaking the game open in the last ten minutes.

With the Lions ahead 38-34 with 13 minutes left, Temple found the range and closed the gap on successive baskets by John Kaskinen.

The teams exchanged buckets for the next few minutes before Kennedy threw in eight points to give Temple a 51-44 bulge with five minutes remaining.

Temple controlled the ball for the final minutes, forcing the Lions to foul.

But things were a lot different the following night as the Egli-men hooked up in a real thriller with Duquesne. The Dukes, who lost to Penn, 71-63, the night before, battled the Lions right down to the wire.

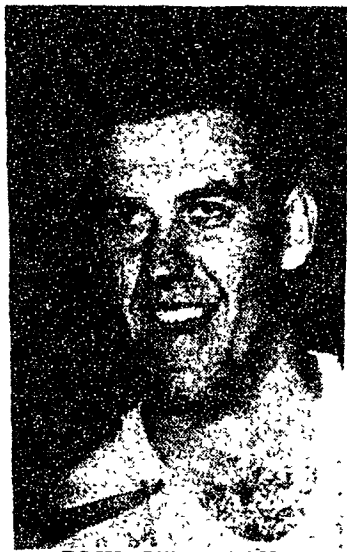
The game was tied 14 times as DuMars and Harris matched the offensive efforts of George Brown and 6-9 Bob Slobodnik.

With Harris, Sweetland and Jake Trueblood doing yeoman service under the boards, the Nittanians opened up a five-point lead, 53-48, with 11 minutes remaining.

Then the Dukes hit a cold spell and Harris and DuMars popped

from all over. The Lions had a comfortable 60-50 spread with eight minutes left and then the Dukes began pecking away, but the lead held up and Nittanians took third place with a 72-69 win.

DuMars was high man but Harris, a soph who was having a slow start this year, had 16 points and 15 rebounds. Sweetland also chipped in with seven points and eight rebounds while

Jake Trueblood had 12 points and 12 rebounds.

Egli was quite pleased with his big men for the first time this year. "They were the difference. If they play like that we should do all right the rest of way. I think Harris became a ballplayer tonight and he'll be a real asset."

Tonight the Lions face a talented Carnegie Tech team which is one of the best in the history of the Pittsburgh school. They have a 6-2 record this year.

The Tartans are highly regarded in small college circles and have been doubly tough on the Lions in Pittsburgh in past years.

The First Annual Keystone Classic was played in the spacious Farm Show Arena in Harrisburg which seats 10,000. . . Nearly 4500 watched the action each night. . . Temple's Russ Gordon was picked as the Most Valuable Player. . . Mark DuMars was third behind Bruce Drysdale of Temple. . . Here's another one for the books. . . Temple and Penn, who played the championship game, traveled from Philadelphia on the same bus, stayed at the same motel and ate together. . . Penn's Bob Mlkvy is the brother of Bill Mlkvy, an All-American at Temple in the early 50's. . . Jack McCloskey after winning the Duquesne game. . . "I

# Lucas, Janerette, Kohlhaas Sign Pro Football Contracts

Three Penn State football stars — All-American quarterback Richie Lucas, and All-East linemen, Charlie Janerette and Bud Kohlhaas — have signed contracts to play professional football next year in three different leagues.

Lucas, much sought-after signal-caller, took time out from a whirlwind tour of post-season All-Star games to ink a three-year \$50,000 pact with the Buffalo Bills of the newly-created American Football League.

The contract which includes a "no-release" clause calls for \$15,000 per year plus a \$5000 bonus for signing. He was also assured of off-season employment with a Buffalo accounting firm.

After choosing the Bill's offer over that of the Washington Redskins who drafted him in the NFL, Lucas said, "I'll have the opportunity to work with a new club in a new league and get it started."

Stellar Nittany guard Bud Kohlhaas also passed up a pact with the 'Skins when he signed with the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian League. Terms of Kohlhaas' contract were reported in

the vicinity of \$19,000 with a \$2000 bonus for his signature.

The National Football League managed to land one Lion. Charlie Janerette, a 234-pound behemoth operating at the tackle slot, agreed to terms with the Los Angeles Rams for an undisclosed sum.

The Redskins, already losers on two out of three bids for Lions, are still courting Nittany tackle Andy Stynchula.
