

## 2nd Weisgall Lecture Set For Tomorrow

Hugo Weisgall, distinguished visiting professor of music, will speak on "Tradition and Revolution" 8 p.m. tomorrow in the Hetzel Union assembly room.

The lecture will be the second in a series of four on "20th Century Opera."

In his first lecture Weisgall described how the early 20th century opera composers failed to live up to the tradition which had been set by Richard Wagner and Giuseppe Verdi in the 19th century.

Friday, Weisgall will tell how opera composers revolted against the 19th century tradition and began writing in a new style.

Weisgall speaks on the development of opera from the viewpoint of a composer. He has written operas, music for ballets, voice and orchestra and is also a conductor.

While teaching a class at the University, he also commutes to New York two days every week to teach at the Julliard School of Music.

### Former Ag Prof Dies; Taught Here 38 Years

Dr. Frederick G. Merkle, 68, who retired in 1957 as professor emeritus of soil technology, died early yesterday at the Centre County Hospital.

He served 38 years on the University faculty and earlier taught at the University of Massachusetts where he had received his bachelor of science and master of science degrees. His doctorate was conferred by Cornell University.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. tomorrow in the Presbyterian Church, State College, with burial in the Centre County Memorial Park.
