

# Pollock Halls to House 1024 Women, 978 Men

The new Pollock Residence Halls will house 1024 women and 978 men when they open in the fall.

Men will live in the two halls directly behind Simmons and McElwain Halls. Each of these will accommodate 225 students.

The largest hall, which is closest to Redifer Hall, will also house men. It will accommodate 528 men.

## Student Forms For Teaching Due Feb. 22

Application for secondary education student teaching assignments must be filed not later than Feb. 22.

Applications should be submitted by the students of the following categories who will be eligible by the end of the spring semester 1960 to enroll in student teaching centers.

All art education majors; business education majors; students enrolled in secondary education 252, graduate or special students who desire student teaching in academic subjects or in one of the majors listed above, and all students who have previously applied but who have not completed their student teaching.

All education majors should secure applications from their advisors or from Dr. Edward L. Mattil, business education majors from Dr. James Gemmill, and students enrolled in secondary education 252 from their secondary education instructors. All others should secure applications from Miss Shirley Reed in 207 Burrows.

Students will be able to teach in Delhaas High School in Bucks County, Abington High School in Montgomery County, and in the Harrisburg city schools in addition to other regular schools.

# Ag College Enrollment Tops 1800

Undergraduate enrollment in the College of Agriculture is the third highest on any land-grant university in the nation, it was reported recently.

The College of Agriculture had 1573 undergraduate students and 294 graduate students in the fall of 1959, according to Dr. Russell B. Dickerson, director of residential education in agriculture. This enrollment was exceeded only by Iowa State University and Cornell University.

Speaking at the annual conference of the Agricultural Extension Service, Dickerson said that the college has increased its scholarship program to \$22,000 available from 45 sources. Last year \$18,515 in scholarships were awarded to 90 students. These scholarships are set up as memorials, business, and industry gifts and awards.

Dickerson added that \$5000 is available in 1960 for student loans. These loan funds come from various foundations and from private grants. He also commented that salaries for agricultural graduates are good. Salaries for 1959 Penn State agricultural graduates ranged from \$3600 to \$5100.

He said agriculture appeals to students from Pennsylvania's industrial areas. A large percentage of students in biological sciences, a major division of the college, come from the counties of Allegheny, Montgomery, Philadelphia and Schuylkill.

## 2nd Semester Coeds Eligible for Scholarships

Applications for the Mary Jane Wyland Scholarships are available in 105 Old Main to any second semester freshman women having a 3.0 All-University average.

The applications must be completed by next Tuesday. The award is made by Scrolls, senior women's hat society.

The four remaining halls are the same size and will accommodate 256 women students each. Two sorority suites will be included in each hall. However, only six suites will be used by sororities in the fall.

The men students living in the Pollock Halls will have their meals in Simmons and McElwain Halls. Women living in Pollock and men living in Nittany will use the Pollock Dining hall.

The North Halls and West Halls will also house men and women. Men will live in Hamilton, Thompson, Watts and Jordan in the West Halls Area. Women will live in McKee.

Beam, Holmes and Leete in the North Halls will house men. Women will live in Runkle Hall.

The 1960-61 housing requests will be available for upperclassmen from Feb. 29 to March 11. About 1800 upperclass men can be accommodated.

Upperclass women who are requesting the same room may also receive their housing contracts from Feb. 29 to March 11. All other upperclass women may request rooms from March 28 to April 8.

# Leetch Announces New Scholarship

George N. P. Leetch, coordinator of scholarships said yesterday that sophomores can now obtain applications for a scholarship to St. Andrews University in St. Andrews, Scotland which is given by the St. Andrew's Society of Philadelphia.

Applications are now available in the scholarship office in 205-D Old Main, and must be returned by April 1.

For the last three years, an American student has been sent to Scotland by this society, and last year they chose a student from the University to study there. George Bentrem is now spending his junior year at St. Andrews studying medicine.

Leetch said that the scholarship is worth \$800 and includes matriculation, class and residence fees, the cost of books, student union dues, athletic union and the majority of the cost of the trans-Atlantic passage.

The Philadelphia society requires that the candidate for the scholarship be an American citizen. Leetch said that they prefer

that the student be in the first quarter of his class, and preference will be given to those of Scottish descent and those who come from the Philadelphia area.

Other requirements are that the candidate should be active in extra-curricular activities, and that he must agree to attend the June meeting of the society in Philadelphia.

The requirements of the St. Andrews University are that the visiting student who is not taking a degree here has to do the full work of the classes he elects to attend, including all class exercises and terminal examinations.
