We sell between 16 and 18 tons of cheese a year," he said.

In the new building, which is constructed in front of the creamery on the north side of Curtin Rd., equipment and facilities will be available to dispense the dairy products more quickly.

On the east and west faces of the 40 by 40 ft. building, glass panels have been erected. These will be the faces used for customer entrance and exit. The north wall will have a service entrance which leads to the creamery.

A U-shaped counter of yellow formica will have 15 stools around it, and cold food display cases will be placed along the eastern wall. In these food cases will be packaged ice cream and cheese in all quantities and milk.

With the new facilities, the creamery will be able to dispense eggs for the first time. Restaurant-type tables will seat about 48 customers in the new half-glass building.

A concrete patio will be built on the outside of the room.

The sales room is being constructed by the physical plant in cooperation with the University creamery sales. John D. Miller, head of the Division of Building Construction, is in charge of erecting the building.

Grad Lecture To Be Given On Wednesday

Four programs have been scheduled for the Graduate Lecture Series during the spring semester.

Dr. Delbert Oberteuffer, professor of physical education at Ohio State University since 1932, will open the series at 8 p.m. Wednesday in 121 Sparks when he speaks on "A Biological Basis for Responsibility in Education." The lecture is co-sponsored by the College of Physical Education and Athletics.

Second lecturer of the series will be Dr. Gerald W. Johnson, Baltimore journalist, who will speak March 1 on "The Man Who Feels Left Behind," co-sponsored by the School of Journalism.
