

AIM Board To Evaluate New Ruling

The Association of Independent Men's executive committee is evaluating the University decision on transfer housing to see if the decision should be protested.

Harald Sandstrom, AIM president, said he was not sure that AIM would take any action on the issue. He said the AIM Board of Governors may discuss it tonight.

The board will meet at 7 tonight in 203 Hetzel Union.

Under the new ruling, men transfer students will be required to live in the residence halls during their first year at the University. Transfers who belong to a fraternity, however, will be allowed to move into the fraternity house immediately.

Sandstrom said he realizes the University must fill the residence halls because of financial problems. He said, however, that he dislikes transfers being given an option to live in a fraternity and not being permitted to live downtown except for financial reasons.

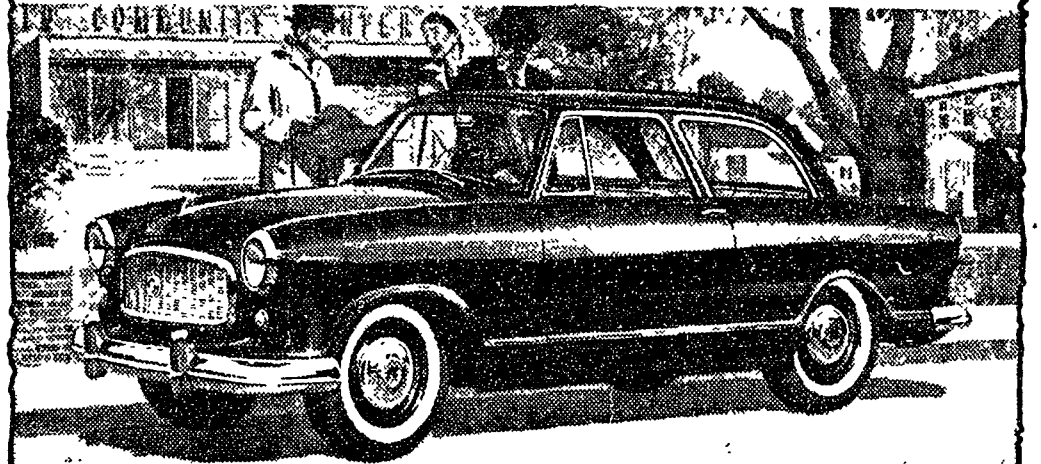

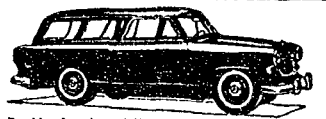
