

Cagers End Home Season

Play Lehigh In Rec Hall Finale at 8

Still burning after last weekend's double setback, Penn State coach John Egli will send a revamped starting line-up against Lehigh tonight at 8 when the Lions close out their home season in Rec Hall.

The veteran coach plans to move Jake Trueblood and Bill Saul up to the first five in place of John Phillips and Gene Harris in an effort to get some added help under the boards.

The two sophomores will join Paul Sweetland, Mark DuMars and Wally Colender as the Lions shoot for win number 10 against 9 losses.

Saul and Trueblood did most of the rebounding even though the Lions lost to Colgate and Syracuse last weekend and Egli feels they'll be a big help against Lehigh tonight.

Saul, used sparingly since joining the cage squad after the Liberty Bowl, came into his own with 13 points against Colgate and 11 at Syracuse.

The 6-4 footballer isn't a polished performer by any means, but his steady improvement earned him the starting assignment.

Trueblood, on the other hand, returns to the first five after a month's absence. The slender, tow-head from nearby Hollidaysburg, lost his job when he was forced to miss the first Bucknell game because of a virus attack.

Phillips did so well as his replacement that Egli was forced to stick with him, and Trueblood became State's number one reserve.

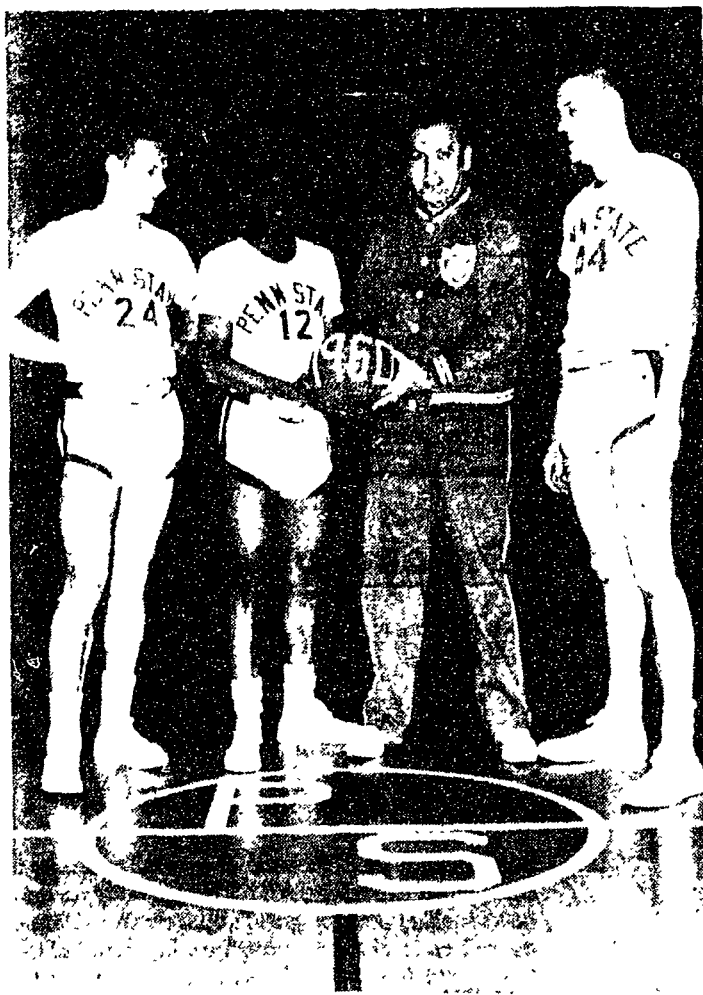
But Jake has come through with some real fine clutch basketball of late and Egli feels he deserves another shot at the starting line-up.

Spotting a 9-9 mark, the Lions must win tonight if they have any hopes of breaking even this season.

Three road games with Pitt, Temple and Rutgers still remain and State just hasn't been successful away from Rec Hall this year.

Lehigh comes into tonight's game with a disappointing 5-14 record, but the Engineers do possess the classiest sophomore in the East.

Norm Brandl, a 6-1 jump shot artist from Roselle, N.J., is break-

ing all sorts of scoring records wherever he goes and right now he's the 11th leading scorer in the nation.

He'll be up against some pretty tough competition tonight when he takes on Penn State's DuMars, who is 16th in the national scoring race.

Brandl has scored 447 points this year for an average of 24.8 points a game. He's the top scorer in the State and leads the Middle Atlantic Conference too.

The rest of Lehigh's starting team will find leading rebounders Ross Culligan and Jack Palfi at forwards, 6-4 Ken Weaver at center and little Bob Happ out front with Brandl.

Three Penn State seniors, Mel Ramey, captain Wally Colender and Paul Sweetland will be playing their last home game for the Lions tonight.

After tonight's game, Penn State travels to Pitt Saturday.

Yank Skater Loses, Hockey Team Gains

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (AP) — Eugeni Grishin, Russia's world champion speed skater, beat America's Bill Disney out of a gold medal yesterday by one-tenth of a second in the 500-meter race at the Winter Olympics.

Grishin's time tied his world record of 40.2 seconds.

In hockey, a Boston insurance man, Bill Cleary, scored four goals, three unassisted, as the U.S. team won its second game in the championship round robin by beating Germany 9-1. The Yanks play formidable Canada today.

United States hopes in the men's figure skating also suffered a setback when David Jenkins wound up third after three compulsory figures. Karol Divin of Czechoslovakia was first and Alain Giletti of France second.

Two more school figures will be skated today. The freestyle, Jenkins' best event comes tomorrow. The unofficial score was Divin 415.5, Giletti 404.0, and Jenkins 401.2.

In the only other gold medal event of the day, Ernst Hinterseer, a Kitzbuhel farmer, captured the men's slalom and restored Austria's badly damaged skiing prestige.

He made the two runs down KT22 Mountain in 1 minute 10.7 seconds and 58.2 seconds for a total of 2:08.9. The runs were on different courses.

Willy Bogner of Germany, who led on the first run in 1:08.8, fell on the second and failed to finish. Americans finished out of the picture.

Second place in the slalom went to another Austrian, Mathias Leitner, in 2:10.3. Charles Bozon of France was third in 2:10.4.

Russians had the team championship of these games won as competition passed the halfway

mark. The Soviets have an unofficial total of 120 points compared to 49½ for second place Germany and the United States' third place total of 44.

Howell Will Quit Giants After 1960 Grid Season
