# AIM Returns Treasury Law To Committee

The Association of Independent Men Board of Governors has re-committed to the finance committee a bylaw outlining the powers of the treasurer.

The bylaw stated in part that the treasurer is to retain all requisition forms in his possession, and that only he may issue requisitions and "at his own discretion."

John Dively, AIM treasurer, who presented the bylaw, said these provisions would give the treasurer more control over expenditures.

# Music Prof to Serve At Instrumental Clinic

James W. Dunlop, professor of music education, will serve as clinician for the Waterloo Instrumental Clinic to be held in conjunction with the Canadian Bandmasters' Association at Waterloo, Ont., Canada, next week.

Dunlop, who conducts the Blue Band will conduct a session on reading new band material.

The faculty of the University has been invited to attend a housewarming from 8 p.m. to midnight Friday of a three-story extension to the house, which was recently completed.

Opened for occupancy this semester, the addition to the house enables the fraternity to rank among the largest at the University, with a house capacity of 65 men.

The new addition, 55 ft. long and 35 ft wide is constructed of stone and modeled after feudal type architecture. The new addition includes two sleeping dormitories, washroom facilities, a kitchen and a permanent house mother's quarters.

In the basement of the new establishment is an air-conditioned chapter room. The kitchen is furnished with stainless steel equipment. Included in the expansion program was the building of a concrete patio, a terrace and a new parking lot.

The dining room in the fraternity was enlarged to twice its previous size and can accommodate 180 people at a sitting. A central fireplace has been installed in the room, also.

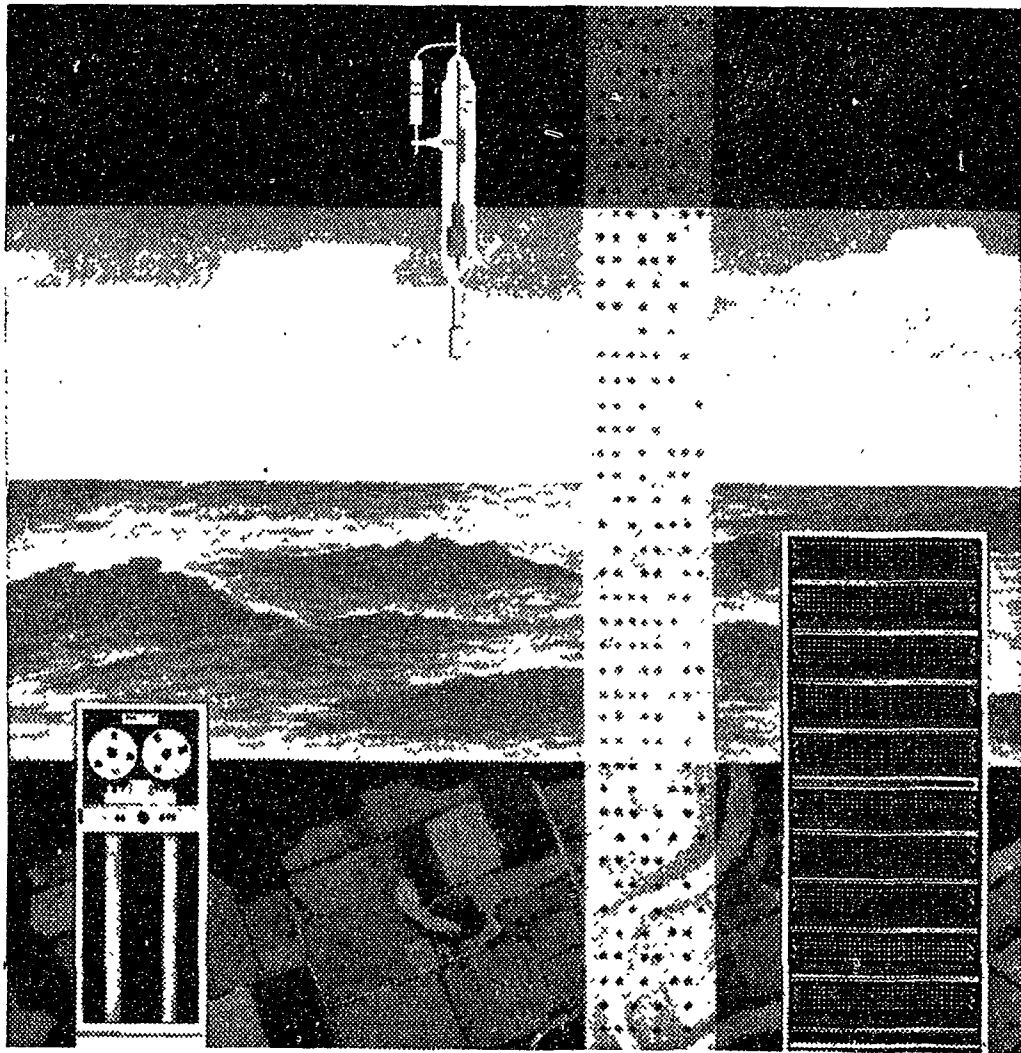
Mary Pappas, junior in arts and letters from Villanova, will be mistress of ceremonies at the festival banquet which is scheduled for April 28.

William Bowers, council president, said that nominations for officers of the council will be held at the next meeting and elections will be held the following meeting.



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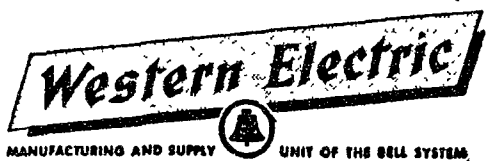
