JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev told Indonesia's parliament yesterday that Asia and Africa should be represented at the summit. "But," he added, "maybe the time is not yet ripe."

Senate Moves To Eliminate Filibuster Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted 67-10 yesterday to back up plans of leaders of both parties for around-the-clock sessions aimed at cracking a Southern filibuster against civil rights legislation.

Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Texas) said he had forced the vote because "I do not want to have the blood on my hands if any accident should befall someone during nonstop sessions due to start Monday."

The vote was not a clear-cut test. Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.) called Johnson's maneuver "a straw man erected to be knocked down."

The vote came on the question of whether the Senate should meet only until 5 p.m. EST Monday instead of staying in session around the clock.

Johnson said he had made a motion to adjourn at that hour so that the majority of the Senate could express its will. Johnson himself voted against it.

Southern forces earlier had adopted a new tactic in their fight against new administration-backed legislation to help guarantee that Southern Negroes can vote in areas where they say they are now illegally kept from the polls.

Princess Meg Engaged To British Photographer

LONDON (AP) — Princess Margaret announced her engagement last night to a commoner, Anthony Armstrong-Jones, photographer for Britain's royal family.

The announcement came just a little more than four years after she had renounced her love for Group Capt. Peter Townsend, and two months after his marriage to his Belgian secretary.

No date has been set for the wedding.

Midas 'Spy' Fails to Go Into Orbit

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla.

(AP)—The United States attempted to launch a huge military "spy" satellite into orbit yesterday but the experiment was wrecked by rocket failure.

A blazing Atlas missile boosted the 24-ton Midas satellite into position for a low-flying orbit but the second stage did not separate and the entire assembly was consumed by friction heat as it dived back into the atmosphere 2500 miles down range.

Radio contact was partially lost soon after the blastoff and for more than three hours the fate of the satellite was unknown. Then the Air Force disclosed the failure.

An attempt to launch a 14-ton Polaris missile also ended in failure when the range safety officer had to destroy it 90 seconds after it was fired.

This first experimental satellite was not aimed for a course over Soviet territory. Its practice mission was to test its equipment on missile launchings from Cape Canaveral and Vandenberg Air Force Base in California.

By next year, however, a series of six or eight of these satellites parading in line through space are expected to provide complete and constant scanning of the earth's entire surface.

Queen Farah Expecting

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Queen Farah of Iran is expecting a child, well-informed sources said yesterday.

The 21-year-old Queen and the 40-year-old thrice-married Shah are currently on a state visit to Pakistan. The Shah married Farah Diba last Dec. 21 in hopes of producing an heir to his throne.

The touring Soviet leader bitterly criticized Japan, supported Indonesia's claims to Dutch West New Guinea, lambasted the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization, denounced colonialism, and preached coexistence and world disarmament.

President Sukarno, Khrushchev's host and guide during his 12-day tour, was not present during the speech.

Khrushchev declared Sukarno's bid for representation at the summit "is the only one which is right." He said other summit members had turned down a Soviet proposal to include neutral nations like India, and "maybe the time is not yet ripe to arrange a more representative summit conference."

But the Big Four meeting in Paris in May will lead to wider talks where African-Asian nations will have their say, he said.

Khrushchev's main theme was peace and disarmament. He said economically backward countries would benefit if the arms race were halted and the money diverted to aid.

He recommended general and complete disarmament and "extensive control of it."

Japan's signing of a new joint U.S. security agreement threatens world peace, he declared, adding a proverb: "If you sow wind, surely you will yield a storm."

By permitting foreign (meaning U.S.) military bases on its soil, he asked if Japan intended to carry out its plan of the 1920s for the conquest of Asia.

Khrushchev called the eight-nation SEATO alliance a dangerous kind of collective colonialism and accused it of "provocations and conspiracies against Indonesia, in Cambodia and Laos."

Applause broke out only once, when Khrushchev said the Soviet Union supports Indonesia in its struggle to get possession of West Irian, or West New Guinea, from The Netherlands.

KDKA Strike Continues

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Negotiators met three hours yesterday in another attempt to end a five-day strike of announcers and performers at KDKA radio and television stations. There was no report of progress.

Navy Plane Crash Investigated in Rio

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Experts hunted deep in Guanabara Bay yesterday for clues to the cause of the air collision that took 61 lives and cast a pall over President Eisenhower's trip to Brazil.

One of the planes was a U.S. Navy transport bringing 19 star members of the Navy band here to play at a dinner the President gave Thursday for President Juscelino Kubitschek of Brazil. It collided with a Brazilian airliner over the bay.

There were only three survivors, all Navy men.

Two U.S. Navy experts arrived from Washington to help investigate the disaster. The United States declined all comment.

All told, the Navy plane carried 19 bandmen, 10 members of the antisubmarine team, 2 other Navy passengers and a crew of 7.

Manual Withdrawn

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Air Force Dudley C. Sharp said Thursday night that his controversial training manual on communism in the churches had been withdrawn.

Sharp denied he told the House Committee on Un-American activities that all charges in the manual are true.
