

Committee to Consider Changes in Greek Week

Changes in the qualifications for the outstanding pledge and highest pledge class average and approval of additions to work projects will be discussed at the Greek Week Committee meeting at 8 p.m. tomorrow in 214 HUB.

Questions on which pledge class will be eligible for the Greek Week pledge awards this year were introduced at last week's meeting and will be decided tomorrow. The problem was created by sororities which do not rush in the fall and sororities which take smaller pledge classes in the fall, and fraternities whose pledge classes overlap several semesters.

Each fraternity and sorority participating in Greek Week may nominate its candidate for the outstanding pledge award. A committee will narrow the group to five finalists and a 3-man faculty committee will pick the final winners.

This year's pledge banquet will be held April 7. Richard Harber, junior in arts and letters from Bethlehem, will be master of ceremonies and Robert Parsky, senior in architecture from Philipsburg, will be the speaker.
