Draft Test Set For April 28

Students who are eligible to take the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System should send now to their local Selective Service Board for an application.

The test will be given April 28, 1960, and applications must be postmarked no later than April 7, 1960, to the Educational Testing Service in Princeton, N.J.

Results of the test will be sent to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student.

According to the Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the test for the Selective Service System, it will be to the student's advantage to apply immediately.

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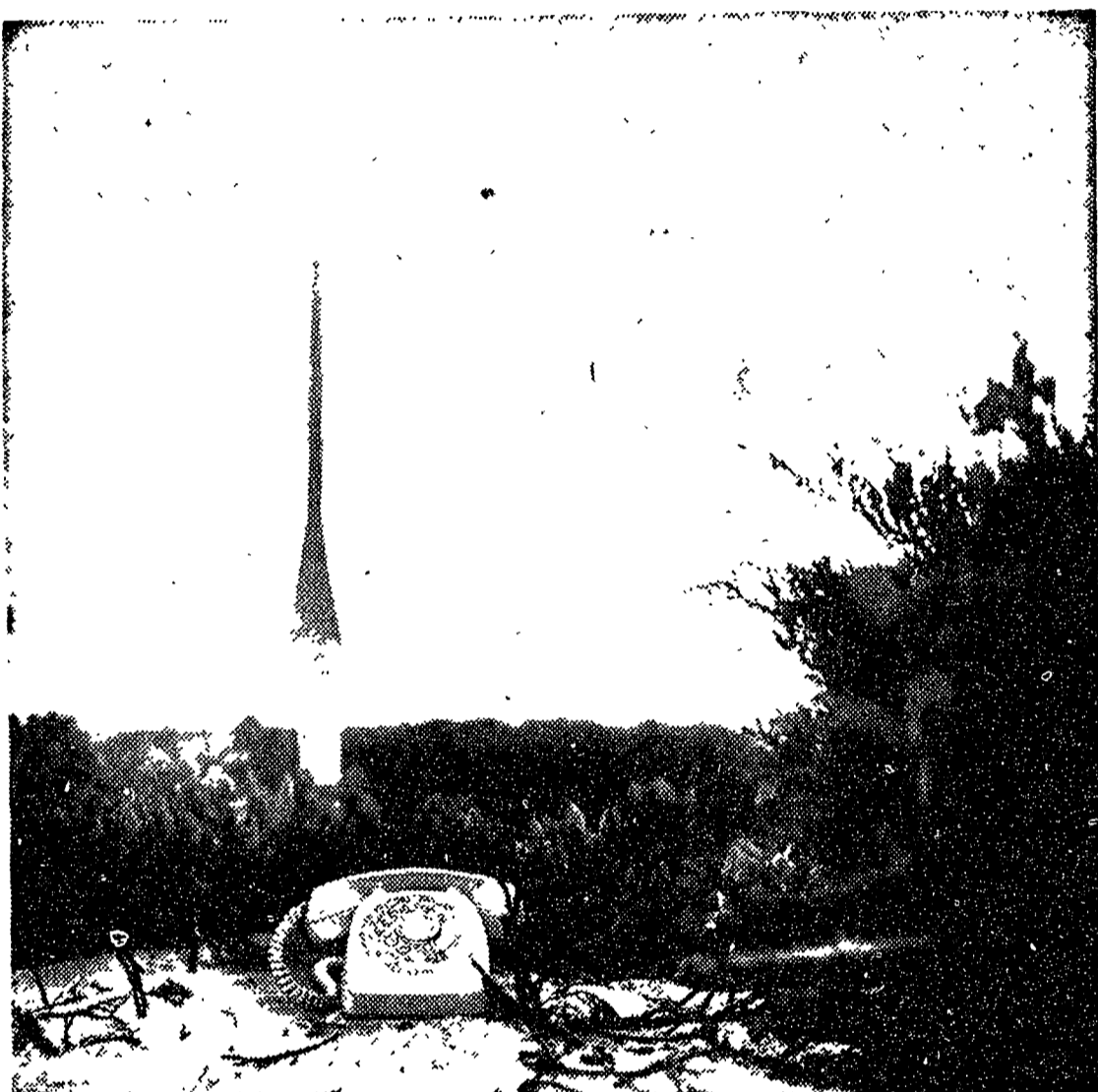

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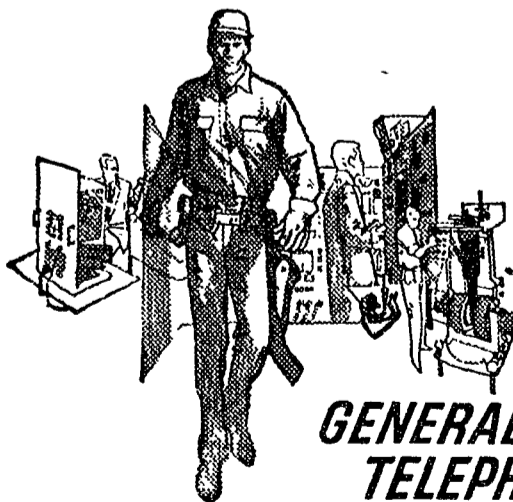
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
