

TV to Explore Ed Challenge

Education, with major emphasis on the elementary and secondary schools, will furnish the topic of discussion tomorrow when "Eye of Channel 10" explores the Soviet challenge on the educational front in a telecast from the campus.

This week's program will be the fourth in a series at 5 p.m. every second Sunday and devoted to the various aspects of the Soviet-American race for supremacy.

Gilbert S. Aberg, moderator, said the panelists will explore the Rickover thesis (calling for less frills and more intensive effort) and James B. Conant's more recent criticisms of the junior high school.

Joining Aberg and Vernon V. Aspatarian, permanent member of the panel, on Sunday's telecast over Channel 10 facilities will be Harry K. Hutton, a specialist in comparative education, and Thomas F. Wagner, professor of Slavic languages.
