

# Schedule Revised For Greek Week

The Interfraternity Council-Panhellenic Council Greek Week committee announced the final schedule for this year's events last night.

Greek Week will last from April 3 to April 11. Working under a theme of "Greeks Together," the 25 societies and about 54 fraternities on campus will compete in six events to determine an all-over Greek Week winner.

Greek Sunday, the women's IFC sing preliminaries, and the Quartet preliminaries will open the week April 3. The sing and quartet preliminaries will be held at 8 p.m. in 121 Sparks.

Men's sing prelims and the Quartet finals will be held at 8 p.m. Monday, April 4 in 121 Sparks.

James Jimirro, graduate student from Beta Theta Pi, will be master of ceremonies for the sing finals which will be held at 8 p.m. Tuesday, April 5, in Schwab Auditorium. The winning quartets will entertain the sing finals, according to Ronald Roth, sing co-chairman.

Exchange dinners are scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 6. Sorority and fraternity members will meet in the lobbies rather than in the suites as in previous years. Sororities will still entertain men in their suites following the dinners, however.

The outstanding sorority and fraternity pledge will be announced at the pledge banquet, scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Thursday, April 7 in the Hetzel Union Dining Room A. The trophy for the fraternity with the highest pledge class average will also be presented at this time.

The bridge tournament is set for 7 p.m. Friday, April 8 in Waring lounge. Nearly 100 per cent sorority and 50 per cent fraternity participation is expected, according to Sue Grossman, tournament co-chairman.

Work projects will be organized all day Saturday April 9 and Greek Week will close with the IFC-Panhel Banquet at 6 p.m. Monday, April 11, in the Nittany Lion Inn main dining room.

## Coeds to Hear WSGA Rules

The new women's rules, sign-out system and the system for recording late minutes will be explained in all women's residence hall, tonight after sign-in hours.

## Hughley to Talk At UCA Forum

"The Christian Faith and the Capitalist Socialist Controversy" will be the subject of a lecture by Dr. J. Neal Hughley, professor of economics at North Carolina College, at 8:15 p.m. Saturday in the Eisenhower Memorial Chapel lounge.

This will be the second lecture in the current forum series on "The Christian and the Problems of Contemporary Culture" sponsored by the faculty committee of the University Christian Association.

Hughley did undergraduate work at Morehouse College and the Union Theological Seminary. He holds a master of arts degree and a doctor of philosophy degree from Columbia University.

As an active leader in Christian social action agencies in the South, he is the author of "Trends in Protestant Social Idealism" and the co-author of "The Christian Way in Race Relations."

The Rev. Preston Williams, acting University chaplain, will present the second paper in the University Christian Association's current series on "Is Christianity Intellectually Defensible?" at 8 tonight in the small lounge of the Eisenhower Chapel.
