

UCA to Hold Annual Series On Marriage

The University Christian Association will present its annual marriage series at 7:30 tonight and tomorrow in 214 Boucke.

"When to Get Married" will be the topic of a panel discussion to be held tonight. Francis L. Whaley, associate professor of psychology, will be the moderator. The panel will discuss the economic and social problems which both undergraduate and graduate married students face.

Aaron Rutledge from Merrill-Palmer Co. in Detroit will speak on "Getting to Know You—The First Years of Marriage" at the Friday session. The problems of getting along with each other, which face newlyweds, will be discussed.

An overnight retreat for engaged people or couples seriously contemplating marriage will be conducted by Rutledge over the weekend at the Bucknell Cabin. Fifteen couples will leave for the cabin at 1:30 p.m. Saturday and return at noon Sunday.

A non-refundable fee of \$3 per couple will be required at the time of registration for the retreat. Couples may sign up at the Hetzel Union Building desk.

Mintz to Speak At HEc Affair

Dr. Norbett L. Mintz, from the Department of Social Relations at Harvard University, will be the featured speaker for the 11th annual Home Economics Spring Weekend to be held April 8 and 9.

Mintz will speak at 4 p.m., April 8, in Schwab Auditorium. His topic will be "Psychological Effects of Surroundings." He will discuss the effects of room conditions, weather, color and music on people.

Mintz received his bachelor of arts degree in economics and psychology from Rollins College in Florida. He received his master of arts degree in psychology and anthropology at the University of New Mexico and a doctor of philosophy degree in psychology at Brandeis University.
