

DuMars Tops Scorers For 2nd Straight Year

Despite a late season slump, Mark DuMars wound up as the leading scorer on the Penn State basketball team for the second straight year.

Official statistics released yesterday show that the junior backcourtman scored 468 points in 22 games for an average of 21.3 points per game.

His 1960 mark was five points higher than last year when he scored 337 points in 20 games for a 16.8 average.

DuMars began the season in spectacular fashion with 109 points in his first four outings against North Carolina State, Purdue, West Virginia and Syracuse.

By midseason he was tenth in the country in scoring with a 23.9 average and it wasn't until the latter part of the campaign that his average dropped.

He was held to 12 points in the second Bucknell game, 14 at Colgate, and 11 last weekend at Temple.

His best nights came against West Virginia and Syracuse early in the season.

The 5-10 "magician" poured in 31 points at Morgantown when the Lions lost to West Virginia, 104-74, and then a few days later he scored 33 against Syracuse at Rec Hall.

Captain Wally Colender, who had some great games, too, finished second with 329 points and a 15-point average.

started second with 329 points and a 15-point average.

Sophomore Gene Harris missed double figures by a 10th of a point and finished third with 218 points and a 9.9 average.

Paul Sweetland (169-7.7) and Jake Trueblood (160-7.6) rounded out the top five.

Harris improved with every game and copped rebound honors with 220. His single game high was 18 in Penn State's 72-69 win over Duquesne in the consolation game of the Keystone Classic.

John Phillips, in and out of the

starting lineup all year, was the team's best shooter.

He made 48 per cent of his field goal attempts and was deadly from the foul line, missing only three the whole season (23-26, 88 per cent).

Penn State coach John Egl will attend the annual Basketball coaches meeting next week in San Francisco, Calif.

The meeting is held each year at the site of the NCAA basketball finals.

Temple Meets Dayton in NIT NYU Upsets Mounties, 82-81

NEW YORK (AP) — It's the spectators, not the players, they're worrying about as the 23rd annual National Invitation Basketball Tourney takes over Madison Square Garden today for a pair of double-headers.

The afternoon twin bill opens with St. Bonaventure (19-3) against Holy Cross (20-5) in the 2:15 game followed by the nationally televised contest that pits Utah (22-4), seeded second in the tourney, against Villanova (20-5) at 4.

The card tonight calls for Dayton (20-6) and Temple (17-8) to take the floor for the 7:30 contest with Providence making its second appearance of the meet against third-seeded St. Louis at 9:15.

In Thursday night's opening round, Villanova, once ahead by as much as 18 points, got four free-throws in the final 34 seconds to win from Detroit, 88-86, and Providence squeaked past Memphis State, 71-70. It wasn't the best basketball in the world

but the close scores kept everyone screaming.

Today's big game may be the Providence - St. Louis affair. The two met previously this winter at St. Louis with the Eastern outfit dropping a 65-61 decision.

Bradley (24-2) and defending champion St. John's of Brooklyn (17-7) don't see action until next Tuesday night when the Illinois Braves meet the Dayton-Temple winner and the New Yorkers oppose the St. Bonnie - Holy Cross victor. The semifinals are Thursday, March 17, with the title decided Saturday afternoon, March 19.

Penn State, UCLA Will Play in '65-66

Penn State and UCLA have announced 1965 and 1966 football dates, bringing to four the number of games now scheduled between the schools.

Athletic Director Ernest B. McCoy and his UCLA counterpart, Wilbur C. Johns, said that the 1965 game will be played Oct. 2 at University Park, with the 1966 contest slated for Oct. 15 in the Los Angeles Coliseum.

Penn State and UCLA will inaugurate grid relations in 1963 with a Sept. 28 game in State's Beaver Stadium. A 1964 game will be played Sept. 26 in Los Angeles.

Gridders Open Sept. 17

Penn State will open its 1960, 1961, and 1962 football seasons at home. Boston U. will provide the opposition in '60 on Sept. 7, with Navy the guest in '61 and '62.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP)—Russ Cunningham's foul shot with eight seconds left in the overtime period clinched for New York University an 82-81 victory over West Virginia last night in the opening game of the NCAA eastern regional semifinals basketball tournament.

Duke defeated St. Joseph's of Philadelphia 58-56 in the second game. Duke plays NYU tonight for a berth in next week's four-team national showdown at San Francisco.

It was Cunningham's jump shot four seconds before the end of the regulation time that tied the score at 77-all and brought on the extra period.

His foul shot gave the NYU Violets a three-point lead and offset a basket by West Virginia's Lee Patrone with two seconds left.

Jerry West, the Mountaineers' All-America ace, led all the scorers with 34 points and was all over the court in a brilliant display of talent.

Tom Sanders was the big scorer with 28 for Coach Lou Rosini's New Yorkers.

Ohio State Scheduled

Penn State is scheduled for football games with Ohio State in 1963 and 1964. Both contests will be played in Columbus.

 SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — An early morning automobile accident could end the career of Boston Red Sox right-handed pitcher Dave Hillman.

Hillman and outfielder Marty Keough were injured when Keough's car hit a soft shoulder and overturned four times. They were on a 12-mile ride from Mesa to Scottsdale.

Hillman suffered a seven-stitch head cut and apparently wrenched his right shoulder.

He appeared at the ball park in the afternoon with his arm in a sling. He insisted he'd be able to pitch.

But Jack Fadden, trainer for the Boston American League ball club, said it might be a week or two before Hillman's future could be determined.

Keough suffered numerous bruises on his back. He apparently was tossed from the car, landing on his back.
