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900 Tickets Remain for Lecture

Over 900 tickets remain for the last lecture in the Darwinian series to be presented by Dr. Leslie A. White, professor of anthropology at the University of Michigan.

White will speak on "The Evolution of Culture" at 8 p.m. Sunday in Schwab Auditorium.

In 1957, White received the Faculty Award for Distinguished Achievement at the University of Michigan and last year was chosen Viking Fund Medalist in general anthropology.

He is a fellow and member of the executive board of the American Anthropological Association and a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science which he has served as vice president and chairman of Section H.

White is a former member, treasurer and vice president of the American Folklore Society, one time chairman of the Anthropology Section of the Michigan Academy of Sciences and a member of the American Association of University Professors.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, Mu Sigma Rho, Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Sigma.

Some background in French is needed for the part of the Grand Duchess, because this character has a long speech which is completely in French. The part of Peter, an ambassador in English service, calls for a British accent.

There are three characters in the play who have no lines at all, but their roles are very important. These are the parts of the two footmen and the butler.

The play, written by Terence Rattigan, is a comedy about an American show girl who gets involved with the Royal Family of Carpathia.

The play ran on Broadway in 1956, and this year was made into the movie, "The Prince and the Showgirl," starring Lawrence Olivier and Marilyn Monroe.

Scripts of the play are available for reading in the Green Room on the second floor of Schwab Auditorium.

The show will be presented on May 5, 6 and 7 in Schwab.

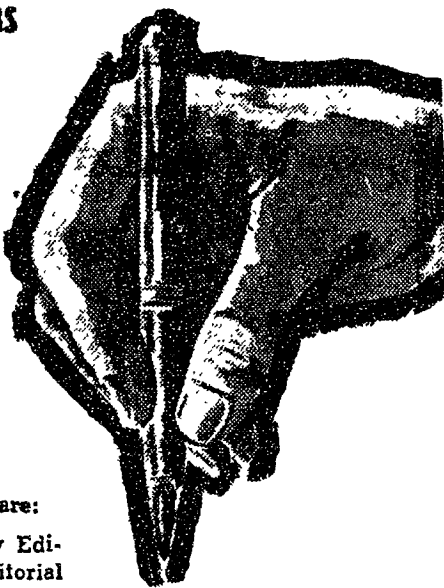

New Medical Plan to Be Used If Approved by Faculty, Staff

Faculty and staff members may attend meetings next week to discuss the proposed Major Medical Expense Insurance Plan which will go into effect May 1 if it is approved by 75 per cent of the members now enrolled in the Hospital-Surgical Plan.

The Hospital Surgical Plan, to which most of the full-time employees belong, covers most usual surgical and hospital expenses but does not extend to prolonged illnesses, a University spokesman said yesterday.

He said the major expense plan would supplement the hospital surgical plan and would possibly cover expenses as high as \$10,000. For example, if a University employe has a medical bill of \$4000, the Hospital Surgical Plan would cover about \$1250, the employe would pay \$700 and the major expense plan would take care of \$2050.

The major expense pays 80 per cent of the bill not covered by the Hospital-Surgical Plan and the employe pays 20 per cent. However, the employe must pay the first \$100 above that covered by the Hospital-Surgical Plan.

If the new plan is passed by 75 per cent of faculty and staff members who now have the hospital surgical coverage, then all new

employees will be required to have the major expense plan. All new employees are already required to join the hospital surgical plan.

However, an employe who now belongs to the hospital-surgical group does not necessarily have to join the new program. The cost of the major expense plan will vary from \$1.10 to \$2.60 depending on the exact type of coverage.


The schedule of meetings for discussion of the new plan may be found in the Faculty Bulletin.
