Lions Qualify for 18 Positions; Tonight's Finals Begin at 8

(Continued from page one) tied for tonight's finals in six events, including the flying rings where he'll defend his national title.

He also qualified for the side horse, free exercise, high bar, still rings and parallel bars. He tied for first on the high bar with defending champion Stan Tarshis of Michigan State and later tied Southern Cal's 5-1 dynamo Sam Garcia for first on the still rings with a 94.

Weiss qualified on the side horse, free 'x', high bar and p-bars, while Cunningham will see action on the side horse, high bar and flying rings in tonight's finals.

Illinois' Hadley and Michigan State's John Daniels look like the men to beat in tonight's free exercise on the basis of performances in the preliminaries, but Werner and Weiss were only a step behind.

The side horse proved to be

State's most productive event with four Lions qualifying Weiss finished fourth, Cunningham sixth, Palmer ninth, and Werner tied for 10th.

Cal's Jim Fairchild, Iowa's Bill Buck and defending titleholder Shurlock led the field and will be the top threats tonight.

Weiss and Werner finished sixth and ninth respectively in qualifying for the p-bars. Southern Cal's Bob Lynn, Buck, Cardinali and Shurlock were most impressive in this event in the prelims.

An unexpected surprise came on the flying rings when Cunningham just managed to qualify with a 10th. Werner and Schaefer tied for second behind Pitt's Dave Hirst while Jon Aaronsohn of Army was fourth.

climb to tie teammate Neuhauser and three others for second place in 3.6 seconds. Mumau had a 3.8.

Navy's Nelson Hulme, EIGL record holder, posted a 3.4 and looks like the man to beat.

The Lions entered only Werner in the tumbling but he failed to qualify as Al Barasch of Illinois paled the field with a sparkling 94.5.

Michigan State's Tom Osterland and Chuck Thompson and Iowa's John McCurdy paced the qualifiers in the rebound tumbling (trampoline). Penn State had no entrants in this event.

The all-around awards will be presented before the meet tonight and other individual awards will be presented following each event. The team champion will receive its trophy at the conclusion of the meet.

Brown Takes 1st Place In Cleveland Track Meet

Special to The Collegian CLEVELAND, Ohio, March 18 (AP)—Penn State's Bobby Brown won the 50-yard dash here tonight and Lion graduate student Ed Moran took second place in the mile run in the Cleveland Knights of Columbus Games.

Brown's 5.2 finish broke the old meet record of 5.3 set in 1957 by Western Michigan's Ira Murchison. Indiana's Eddie Miles, who beat Brown in Chicago and Milwaukee last week, finished second.

Jim Beatty, former North Carolina star came in first in the mile in 4:07.1. Moran was second and Brian Hewson of England was third.

Penn State's 2-mile relay team did not finish among the first three. Yale was first, Manhattan second and Michigan third.

Hayes Jones of Eastern Michigan romped over the 50-yard high hurdles in 59 seconds for a world record, defeating olympian Lee Calhoun for the seventh straight time.

Jones' mark erased the 60 record set by Harrison Dillard in 1953 at Philadelphia and tied twice since—once by Rod Perry of Penn State and once by Calhoun.

6 Homers Help Tribe Beat Boston TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—The Cleveland Indians belted six home runs, two each by rookie Walt Bond and Norm Cash to bury the Boston Red Sox 11-6 yesterday.

The 6-foot-6 Bond also had a single as he sparked the Indians with six runs batted in. Catcher John Romano and shortstop Gene Leek also homered for the Indians.

Ex-Buc Electrocuted SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Robert J. (Bobby) Thorpe, 25, former National League baseball pitcher with the Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago Cubs, was electrocuted here Thursday. Thorpe quit baseball last fall because of arm trouble. He was at work on a power line as an apprentice electrician when he was killed.
