 cipline which will meet some-time next week.
 Patsky also said that although SPE's loss of social privileges went into effect at midnight Tuesday, he has given Kappa Delta sorority permission to hold its pledge dance at SPE this Saturday.

The board also suggested to DU that they take additional action concerning Alman and that they depledge him for "conduct unbecoming a Penn State student and a member of the fraternity system."

James Anderson, president of DU, said last night that the fraternity has not yet met as a whole to discuss the IFC Board's recommendation but that they took disciplinary action soon after the incident occurred.

Anderson said that the fraternity decided to take "constructive action" and therefore decided that Alman must comply with several conditions in order to remain a pledge. One of these is that his initiation date has been delayed temporarily for six months, possibly longer.

Modern Life Viewed As Series of Stages

In explaining his theory of "historic time" versus "cyclical time," Dr. Paul Pickrel of Yale University last night said that life is now less of a curve and more of a process of segmented stages.

Pickrel spoke at a Liberal Arts Lecture Series program.

He cited today's teenager as an example of our social groupings. The word teenager does not even appear in the 1936 edition of Webster's Unabridged Dictionary. The segment of our population "twixt thirteen and twenty have only felt themselves part of a "stage" since the second world war, Pickrel said.

The problem of identity—our sense of who and what we are—has arisen out of the lack of continuity between the periods of our lives, he said. "Our less habitual life brings about a loss of identity, cyclical time gave life shape," he added.

During cyclical life, he said, most human activity was tuned to the span of a day, a year or an individual lifetime. Our diet, work

schedule, vacations and even wars which were previously keyed to the seasons have been hidden and disguised by technological developments, but life is still there. It may begin away from home, last a little longer and end in a different place from its beginning, but it begins, goes on, and ends just the same.
