

APhiA, Phakes Capture IM Basketball Crowns

Alpha Phi Alpha and the Phakes, who have lost a grand total of one game in two years, reign as the 1960 IM basketball champions.

APhiA used a strong second half rally to beat Delta Tau Delta, 35-22, and the Phakes rolled to their 24th straight IM victory by smashing the Masters, 78-44, last night in Rec Hall.

IM director Dutch Sykes said plans are being worked out for a playoff game between the Independent and Fraternity champs.

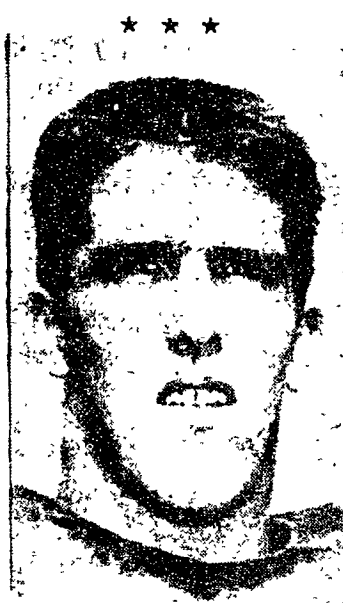
Last night's games were entirely different in style and strategy. The Phakes used an overpowering offense combined with a zone defense while APhiA played ball control with a pressing man to man defense.

Footballers Dick Hoak and Don Jonas combined for 47 points to lead the Phakes to their smashing win. Hoak, using a deadly one hand jumper, poured in 27 points and Jonas had 20 markers.

The Masters jumped off to a quick 4-0 lead on two buckets by Charlie Sieminski but that was their only lead of the game. Hoak broke the ice for the Phakes and tied the game at 4-4 and then Jonas put the Phakes in the lead with a 15-foot jumper from the key.

Jonas scored 10 more points in the first quarter as the Phakes opened up an 18-10 lead.

Spurting for eight straight points at the beginning of the second quarter the Phakes upped

their lead to 26-10 and the Masters never recovered.

Carl Decaspers hit a jumper from 12 feet to narrow the margin to 26-12 and Sieminski canned a fade-away hook, but this was the last serious Master threat. The score stood 38-23 at halftime.

Hoak went wild on jumpers and lay-ups in the second half while his teammates continued to help out with fine play. Pharoah and

Bud Torris also hit in the double figures for the Phakes scoring 18 and 10 points respectively.

In fraternity play, APhiA had too much basketball ability for an undermanned Delta Tau Delta team.

John Stanford led the scorers with 11 points and he clinched the game for Alpha Phi Alpha with 4 straight buckets in the third quarter. This broke up a relatively close game and widened the gap to 30-16.

Neither team was able to hit from the field or the foul line and at times the play was shoddy and slow.

Bud Kohlhaas brought the Deltas within three, 15-12, but Ish Johnson hit on a long one-hander for APhiA to make it 17-12 and then his teammates put on an all court press which completely ruffled the Deltas.

Commissioner Nullifies Cleveland-Boston Trade

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP)—The controversial Cleveland-Boston trade was nullified yesterday by baseball Commissioner Ford Frick pending official notification from catcher Sammy White that he has retired.

Frick wired general managers Bucky Harris of the Red Sox and Frank Lane of the Indians ordering the return of utility man Jim Marshall to Boston and catcher Russ Nixon to Cleveland.

The orders officially are labeled "temporary" because Frick

still must receive retirement papers from White.

However, Frick said he acted on the ground White publicly has announced his retirement.

Boston traded White and Marshall for Nixon March 16. Three days later, without reporting to the Indians, White said he was quitting because of a heavy investment in a \$1,500,000 bowling center in Boston and that he could consider continued playing only in a Boston uniform.

Nixon has expressed his preference for the Red Sox because they raised his salary and he believes Lane will merely trade him off again. The catcher says he will confer with American League president Joe Cronin in the hope he can work under a contract the Red Sox gave him.

Manager Billy Jurges of the Sox told Nixon to turn in his uniform yesterday while explaining the situation. Nixon will remain with the Boston club until this afternoon when the team can drop him off at Tucson during an exhibition game with the Indians.

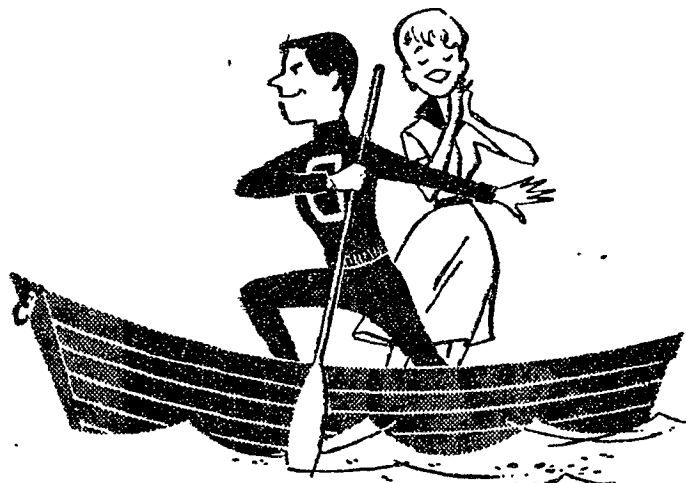
