WUS Conducts Search For 'Best Loved Prof'

During this week the World University Service is conducting a search for Penn State's "best loved professor" who will be known as Professor Snarf.

From the list of candidates, a student may find that in addition to belonging to honoraries and societies, his choice may have been a fraternity man. Perhaps he didn't know that his favorite chemistry professor is a criminologist or that his history teacher has a famous collection of miniature soldiers.

Martha Adams, assistant professor and the choice of the Physical Education school, comes from Waynesboro. While an undergraduate at William and Mary College, she was a member of Pi Lambda Theta honorary and Gamma Phi Beta sorority.

The School of Agriculture has chosen Dr. J. Frank Cone, associate professor of bacteriology, as its favorite professor. He received his bachelor of science degree from the University of Idaho and a doctor of philosophy degree from the State College of Washington.

Dean Lawrence Perez, assistant dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture, came to Penn State in 1944. He is married and has three children. While a undergraduate at the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute he was a member of Alpha Chi Rho fraternity.

A Penn. Stater all her life, Dr. Mary Willard, candidate from the College of Chemistry and Physics, was born in Moffatt Cottage on the campus. Miss Willard performs chemical analyses of poisons, drugs, blood-stains and other materials in connection with criminal cases in Pennsylvania and surrounding states.

An ardent bowler, Clifford A. Nelson of the College of Business Administration was born in Hazleton. He was a member of Zeta Beta Tau fraternity and Delta Sigma Pi professional fraternity at Bloomsburg State College where he received a bachelor of science degree. He also holds a master of science degree from Bucknell University.

In addition to teaching European history, Dr. Kent Forster of the School of the Liberal Arts conducts summer seminars in Europe for American students. Forster did his undergraduate work at Washington and Lee University and his graduate studies at the University of Pennsylvania. In 1956-57 he served as a Fulbright Lecturer at the University of Helsinki. As a member of the Miniature Collectors Society, he owns nearly 1000 toy soldiers.

Dr. Marjorie East, head of the Department of Home Economics Education, was born and educated in California. She graduated from San Jose State College and did her graduate work at UCLA and Columbia University.

Gene Wettstone, candidate from the School of Physical Education, was Big-Ten all-round champion gymnast for three years while a

student at the University of Iowa. Wettstone, a native of Union City, N.J., served as Olympic coach at London in 1948, international judge at the games in Helsinki and again as coach at Australia in 1956. While a graduate student at the University of Cincinnati, Dr. Clyde G. Corle, associate professor of elementary education, did his research on the thought processes in teaching elementary school arithmetic. Corle, who is married and has two children, was born in New Madison, Ohio. In his spare time, Corle likes to play bridge or work in his garden.

Dr. Laurence Lattman, assistant professor of geomorphology in the College of Mineral Industries, was born in New York City and did his undergraduate work at the City College of New York. 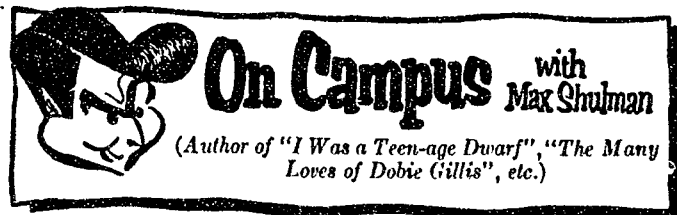
Tickets cost \$1 per person. At Las Vegas Night, students will be able to gamble legally in a night club atmosphere.

"But this is November 27, Westnor," said Anna Livia.

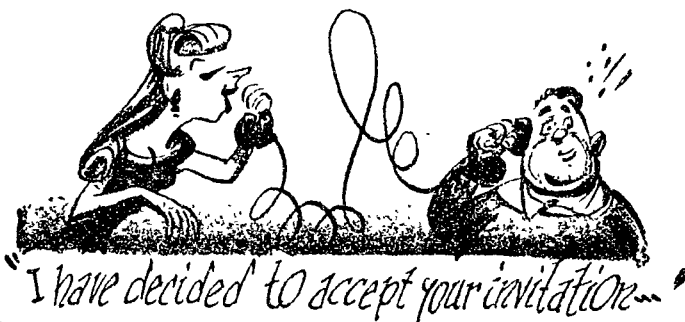
"Werther," said Werther. "Yes, I know, but you are so round and beautiful that I was afraid you might have a date already."
