Koons Claims Innocence In Ordinance Violation

Lawrence Koons, junior in business administration from Shenandoah, and one of the students who was in the La-Galleria Restaurant on E. Beaver Ave. when it was raided on March 18 claims he is innocent.

Koons said he had just stepped inside the door when the State Liquor Control Board raided the establishment. He said that, although physically in the building, he wasn't a patron. He was in the restaurant simply for the purpose of keeping himself warm and not for purchasing an alcoholic beverage.

The officials from the Liquor Control Board who were conducting the raid refused to allow him to leave and made him sign a questionnaire to the effect that he was in the building.

Koons admitted being in the restaurant, but claimed he was waiting for a friend who will

testify at Koon's hearing. Koons was originally scheduled to have his hearing with the 28 other students who were charged. (Continued on page twelve)

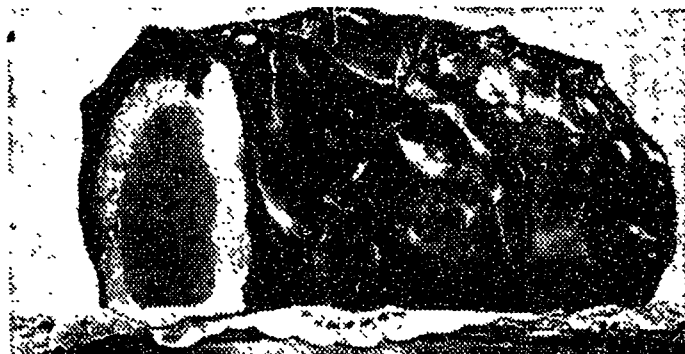
