The outstanding sorority and fraternity pledges for 1959-60 will be announced tonight at the annual Greek Week Outstanding Pledge Banquet.

The Fraternity pledge class with the highest scholastic average will also be presented with the Interfraternity Council Pledge Class Scholarship Award.

Deadline Set For Entries In Pageant

April 22 has been set as the deadline for entries in the Miss Centre County Pageant, Doyle Corman, publicity chairman for the event, said today.

Any young woman who will be a high school graduate and between the ages of 18 and 28 as of Sept. 1 is eligible to enter. She must have lived in Centre County for the past six months or be attending the University, and, of course, be single.

All entrants will be required to participate in three events: a 3-minute talent routine open to either amateur or professional performers, an evening gown and a bathing suit event. The judges will be looking for a Miss Centre County with good character, poise, personality, intelligence and beauty of face and figure.

Anyone interested in entering the pageant to be held at 8 p.m., May 13 in the Bellefonte Junior High School auditorium may get entry blanks from Mrs. Frank G. Clemson, Raymond Higgins or Mrs. David Coleman.

The Outstanding Pledge awards will be presented by Mrs. Norma Mountain, assistant to the dean of women and Wilmer E. Wise, assistant to the dean of men in charge of fraternity affairs.

Ronald Novak, IFC president, will present the pledge scholarship award.

Five points toward the overall Greek Week trophy will be given to each sorority and fraternity represented at the banquet. The winners of the Outstanding Pledge award will receive five more points for their respective groups.

The Pledge Banquet is the fourth event in Greek Week. Last night 40 fraternities and 23 sororities participated in exchange dinners. Fraternity men picked up their sorority guests in the residence halls and took them to their houses for dinner.

Sorority hostesses entertained reciprocally in the residence halls. Following dinner the guests were entertained in the suites and houses until 8 p.m.
