Outgoing SGA president Leonard Julius presented 18 Penn State Student Scholarship checks for \$150 at the special meeting which preceded the Assembly meeting Thursday night.

The new Assembly approved the appointment of Robert Umstead as the 1960 Student Encampment chairman. The appointment had been made by former president, Leonard Julius, subject to the approval of the new president and the Assembly.

Jacqueline Leavitt (U-Sr) cast the only dissenting vote. She said she felt Umstead should be present to be questioned on his policies before the Assembly approved his appointment.

Assembly also approved the appointment of Walton Davis, former Assemblyman, as Encampment business manager.

Davis reported to the Assembly that a change in the location of the Encampment had been considered because of a limitation of space at Mount Alto, where Encampment has traditionally been held. The alternative was to hold Encampment on the campus.

An Administration Student Affairs Committee had considered the change, Davis said, but their decision was not announced because it was felt the students should discuss the matter first.

Alpha Xi Delta and Lambda Chi Alpha will receive the trophies for first place in the Greek Week poster contest at the Interfraternity-Panhellenic Banquet Monday night.

Phi Sigma Sigma and Delta Chi will receive plaques for second place and Sigma Sigma Sigma and Chi Phi will be awarded third place honors.

Sophs Sponsor Lion Suit Drive

The Sophomore Class Advisory Board is sponsoring a drive to raise money for a new suit for the Nittany Lion, according to Duane Alexander, sophomore class president.

The Daily Collegian erroneously reported yesterday that Nittany Council is holding the drive. In its meeting Thursday night the Council voted to underwrite up to \$100 toward the drive, but not to hold its own drive, Barry Rein, Nittany Council president, said.

Letters had been sent to all organizations on campus requesting \$3 to \$5 toward the purchase of the suit, Alexander said. According to Rein, Nittany Council received one of the letters and since the Council had funds on hand, it decided to donate more than the requested amount.

The first place winners will receive 20 points toward the overall Greek Week trophy. Second place winners will receive 15 points and third place, 10 points.

Greek Week will continue tomorrow afternoon when members of 43 fraternities and 24 sororities will participate in 38 different community service projects. Projects will range from working on the Stone Valley and Whipples Dam areas to sending out cards for the Bloodmobile.

Other projects include a car wash, a clothing drive, cleaning and painting the Soal Barn Theatre and the Mateer Playhouse, policing the Hetzel Union grounds and cleaning many area playgrounds, churches, schools and similar areas.

The over-all Greek Week Trophy will be presented at the banquet scheduled for 6 p.m. Monday in the Nittany Lion Inn. In addition to the poster contest awards, trophies for the bridge tournament winners and the scholarship honors will be presented. The Sing, Quartet and Pledge Class Scholarship trophies have already been presented.

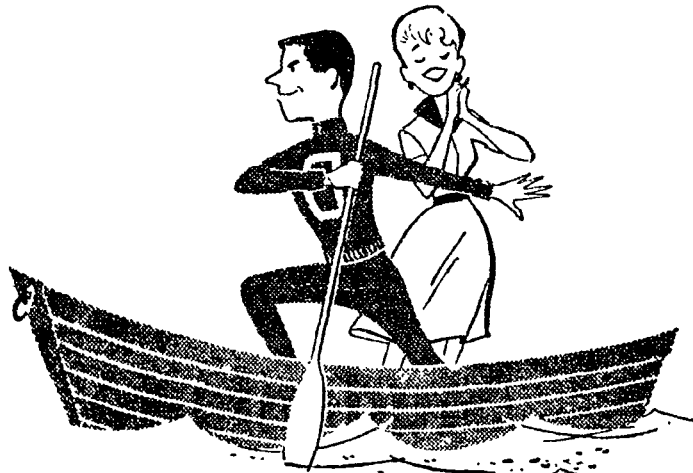

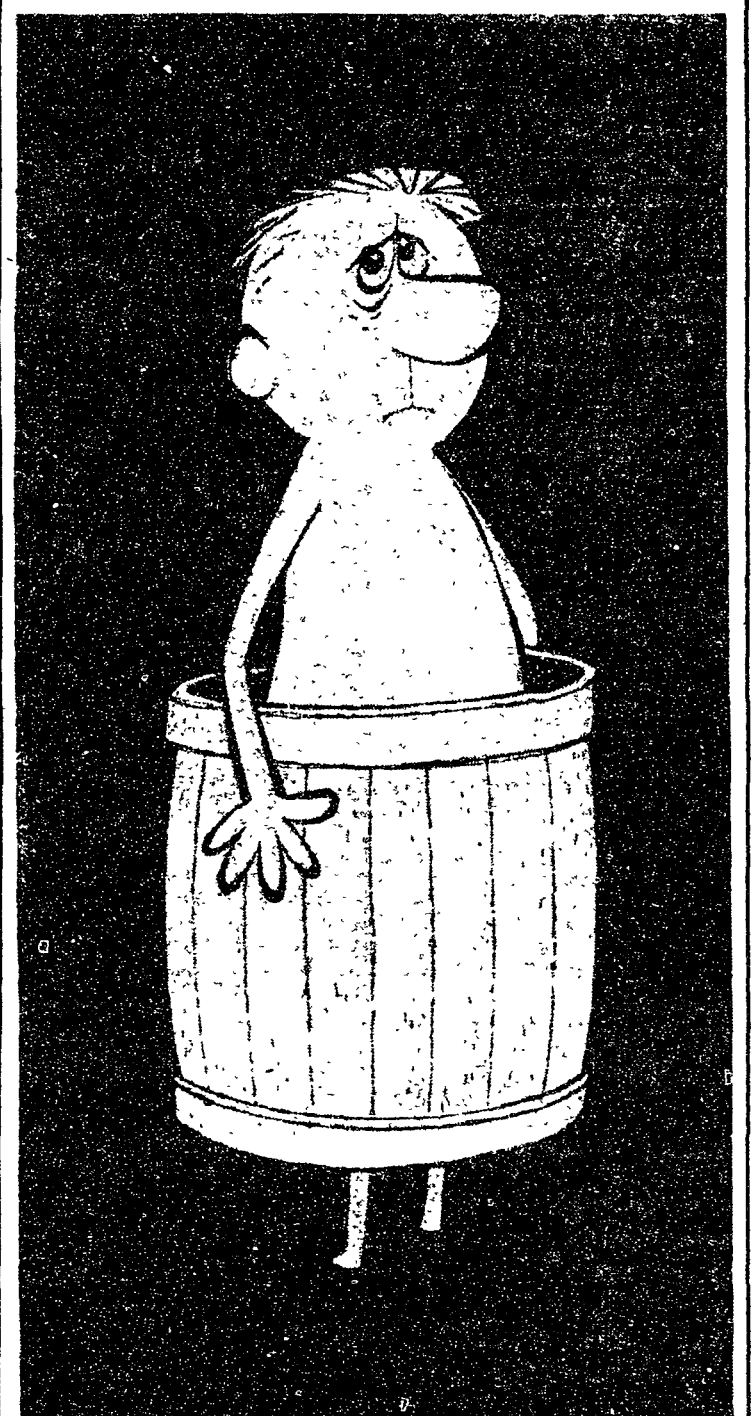
