West Virginia Pulls Upset, 7-5, Lions Leave 14 Men Stranded

Penn State blew scoring opportunities galore yesterday and West Virginia took advantage of all theirs for a 7-5 win over the Nittany Lions at Beaver Field.

Failure to hit in the clutch again proved to be State's downfall as the Lion hitters left 14 men stranded on the basepaths. The loss, State's third against six wins, was extremely costly because the Lions missed a good chance to pick up some valuable ground on the other District II frontrunners.

Gary Saunders, who pitched four innings of superb relief ball, was the winning pitcher for West Virginia while Eddie Kikla took the loss for the Lions. It was the third loss in five decisions for Kikla, far below what the Lion coaches expected of the southpaw star who finished with a 9-1 mark in 1950.

Kikla gave up seven hits and six earned runs before leaving with one out in the seventh. Marlin Biesecker went the rest of the way, allowing the Mounties four hits and their final run.

State scored first in the second inning when West Virginia starter Paul Chuma had trouble finding the plate and walked four men to force in a run.

The Mounties tied it in the third on a walk and a pair of basehits, only to see State forge ahead 3-1 in the fifth.

After Zeke DeLong skied to center, leftfielder Jim Suplizio singled to deep short and took second on Ed Tekavec's poor throw.

Roger Kochman fled to left but Larry Beighey reached first on an

error by third baseman Tom Stepp.

Harry Beans kept up his clutch hitting with a run-scoring single and Mountie reliever Jim Carter walked Kikla to load the bases. Don Robinson worked Carter for another walk forcing Beighey home and Bob Hrobak grounded into a force-play to end the rally.

West Virginia took a short-lived lead with three runs in the top of the sixth on a double by Paul Popovich, a single by Craig Menkin and a two run homer by first baseman Tom Shafer.

Not to be outdone, the Lions scored twice in their half for a 5-4 bulge.

The see-saw affair ended in the seventh when the Mounties chased Kikla and pushed across a pair of runs on three hits, a walk, and an error.

West Virginia added an insurance run in the ninth off Biesecker to sew up their eighth win of the season. They've lost six.

Larry Fegley and Jim Suplizio did most of the offensive work for the Lions while Popovich had

a perfect day (4-4) for the Mountaineers.

Fegley, the Lions most consistent hitter, went 2-for-5 and moved his average to .444 while Suplizio had another 3-for-4 day to raise his average to .538.

Penn Golfers End Lions' Win Streak

PHILADELPHIA, April 27 — The Penn golf team ended Penn State's four game win streak here Wednesday with a 5-2 win that established the Quakers as the team to beat for the Eastern title.

Penn now has an 8-1 record. The Quakers lost only to Navy in a match that broke their 22-meet win streak.

Playing in place of Captain Dick Burgoon who was forced to miss the trip at the last minute, Bob Goldsamt (P) beat Kormos (PS), 4 and 3. Kline (P) beat Morton (PS), 5 and 3. Kleimon (P) beat Thomas (PS), 5 and 5. Rutherford (PS) beat Calihan (P), 2 and 1. Swahn (PS) beat Gyles (P), 2 and 1.

Penn's Jim Graybill then won 3 and 2 over Roy Altman, thus reversing a setback suffered to Altman last year.

The Quakers added three more wins by Bob Goldsamt, Chris Kling, and Murray Kleimon before the Lions scored again.

Lion sophomores Bob Rutherford and Bob Swahn came through with twin 2 and 1 wins over the Quaker's Joe Calihan and Bob Gyles in the last two matches. Swahn's win gave him a 2-0 record.

Penn State's 4-3 log will be up for another test Saturday against Lehigh at University Park.
