

# Panhel Announces Fall Rush Program

The final plans for the Fall semester rushing program have been announced by the Panhellenic Council.

All rushees, who may be former on-campus students or transfer juniors with a 2.0 All-University average or second semester freshmen with a 2.3 All-University average, will be required to attend all the sorority open houses.

The open houses will be held on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 18, and Saturday and Sunday afternoons, Sept. 24 and 25. Each rushee will be part of a guided group which will spend 15 minutes at each sorority.

The informal rushing period will extend from Monday, Sept. 26, through Wednesday, Oct. 5. Each sorority will decide which hours it will be rushing. Standard Panhellenic invitations will be issued by the sorority to the rushee and delivered to her under her door.

If the invitation is issued for a function on the same day, it must be delivered to the rushee's room before 8 a.m. and returned by 1 p.m. of that day by the rushee to the designated place where each sorority will pick up the invitations by 2 p.m. The rushee will check each invitation either accept, interested but no time hours, or reject.

Bids may not be issued before 5 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 5. A bid may be issued to a rushee only after she has visited the sorority suite a maximum of four times.

Sorority preferential lists shall be submitted to the dean of women's office at 8 a.m., Oct. 7. All bids and lists will be matched according to IBM preferential bidding.

Ribboning will take place at 7 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 7.

Points for the booths will range between the maximum 250 and the minimum 100 points for each of the three criteria. Points for tickets will be awarded by deriving a percentage of points of all tickets collected up to 850.

Preliminary points from the carnival will be used to determine winners by computing the points under an over-all point system. The group which places first in the carnival will get 40 points; the second, 25 and the third, 15.

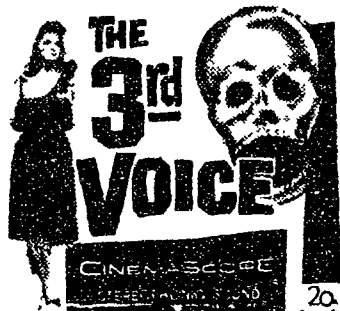
