

# U.S. 'Bandit' Plane Was Weather Craft

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States indicated yesterday the "bandit" U. S. military plane Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev boasted was shot down on a mission of intimidation actually was an unarmed weather study craft whose civilian pilot may have blacked out.

"It is entirely possible that having a failure in the oxygen equipment which could result in the pilot losing consciousness, the plane continued on automatic pilot for a considerable distance and accidentally violated Soviet air space," the State Department said.

Its report—issued after a hurry-up inquiry ordered by President Eisenhower—suggested this possibility in mild words that avoided any reference to Khrushchev's belligerent declaration that the plane was sent by U.S. "aggressive forces."

Khrushchev told the Soviet Parliament the plane may have been ordered out by the U.S. military—perhaps without Eisenhower's knowledge—to "impress us and frighten us on the eve of the summit."

The President said nothing publicly, but ordered the State Department and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to make an inquiry and public reports, which they did within hours.

Although nobody in authority would say so definitely, it appeared the plane was a NASA high-altitude weather research craft.

The single-engine jet U2 Lockheed was reported missing since Sunday after taking off from a field near Adana, Turkey. That was the day Khrushchev said an intruding U.S. military plane was shot down over Soviet territory. The pilot of the plane was identified by Lockheed yesterday as Francis G. Powers, 30.

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# 'K' Announces Plan to Abolish Income Taxes

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev announced yesterday the Soviet Union will abolish almost all income taxes by the end of 1965, boosting Soviet workers' take-home pay by 74 billion rubles.

He also announced a revaluation of the ruble, effective Jan. 1, 1961, to put it on par with the U.S. dollar.

He told a joint session of the Supreme Soviet that workers would be progressively exempted from income tax over the coming five years until the tax is abolished for all factory and office workers earning up to 2000 rubles a month.

Workers making more will also have their income taxes abolished, but their pay will be cut accordingly. Income taxes also will be wiped out for single persons and those with small families, regardless of the amount of their pay, Khrushchev added.

## House Approves Plan For Area Redevelopment

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House shouted approval Wednesday night of an administration-opposed \$251 million area redevelopment plan despite threats of a veto.

An estimated 32 major industrial areas, more than 100 smaller ones and several hundred rural countries would be eligible for assistance.

## Campaigners 'Stump' W.Va.

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP)—The national principals in West Virginia's May 10 primary—Sen. John F. Kennedy (D.-Mass.) and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D.-Minn.)—campaign yesterday in industrial areas at opposite ends of the state.

Humphrey stumped the Catholic territory around Wheeling trying to offset the expected strength there of Kennedy, whose Roman Catholic religion has become a major issue in this predominantly Protestant state.

He spoke to students of Wheeling Catholic College and was on hand for a change of shifts at an industrial plant.

Kennedy put in a vigorous day in the Charleston vicinity, where coal and chemicals are the main industries.

Kennedy was asked how he expects to do in the contest next Tuesday.

He replied that the opinion polls all seem to show he is running behind.

## Students Harass Turkish Premier

ANKARA, Turkey (AP)—Premier Adnan Menderes was booed, heckled and jostled yesterday by student demonstrators demanding his resignation. Menderes placed his right hand on his heart and cried out: "Then kill me!"

The 61-year-old Turkish strongman was not injured by the students, but his hair was rumpled and his shirt tail pulled out. He was moved to tears.

The demonstrations, staged in defiance of martial law, were the latest in a series that began last Thursday to protest Menderes' political tactics, especially the muzzling of the political opposition and press.
