

Beans Wins Starting Job On Hustle, Enthusiasm

When Penn State opened its baseball campaign last month, catcher Harry Beans was among the forgotten men, but now he's one of the bright stars in an otherwise dismal picture.

A .205 hitter last year, Beans seemed destined for splinter duty behind Jim Suplizio and John Adams this season. In fact when the Lions opened against Gettysburg, Beans was the number three receiver.

But baseball being baseball, Beans got his chance on the Lions' first road trip and he came through with two important RBI in his first start against Penn.

Adams wasn't hitting and Suplizio was needed for duty in leftfield so Beans had a chance for the permanent job and he made good with his clutch hitting while the rest of his teammates floundered.

Right now the likeable backstop from nearby Boalsburg is batting .355, second only to Larry Fegley, who is still in the hospital with the measles.

Beans' sudden emergence as a star is due to nothing but "hard work, enthusiasm, and competition," says Lion coach Joe Bedenk.

"Harry has little natural ability but he has that little extra in him that makes a good ballplayer," Bedenk said yesterday.

"You know after the game Wednesday (the Lions beat Bucknell, 10-3) one of the scouts came over to me and was telling me that if I had five or six like Harry I wouldn't be having so much trouble this year."

Not exceptionally fast or powerful, Beans relies on punching the ball for his hits. He's the best hit and run man on the Lion squad and he's driven in quite a few runs that way this year.

Behind the plate Beans works wonders with the pitchers, steadying them when they're wild and pacing them just right on a good day.

Off the field Beans has to rate as one of the best too. At the start of the year when Adams had ap-

parently beaten him out of a job, Beans was full of praise for his roomie.

"Even though it means I won't play that much I'm glad to see John get a break. He deserves it because he's always out here working hard to improve himself," Beans said a few days before he went out and won his old job back.

Spikers Host V-Ball Finals On Tap Tonight Quantico Tomorrow

Penn State track fans will be in for a treat Saturday when the Marines from Quantico invade Beaver Field for a dual meet with Chick Werner's Lions.

The Nittany thinclads, shooting for their first outdoor dual meet victory of the season, couldn't have picked a tougher opponent.

Quantico boasts a host of track stars including Al Cantello, world record holder in the javelin, ex-Villanova sprint star Ed Collymore, former St. Johns' miler Pete Close, ex-Southern Conference sprint champ Walt Fillman, and Mel Schwartz, a 15-foot plus pole vaulter.

Cantello will present a tough challenge for Jim Schwab, Penn State record holder in the javelin. Cantello has heaved the 1 1/2-pound spear 281-2 feet, a world record. Schwab's best effort was 223-11 1/2 in the Manhattan meet last year.

Fillman and Bobby Brown will hook up in a rematch of their Quantico Relays 100 meter sprint dual earlier this year. In that race Fillman beat Brown out of the blocks and the big Penn Stater never caught up. Fillman finished in 10.6 and Brown in 10.7.

Lion fans will get their first look this year at Dick Campbell, who set a new Penn State record in the high jump by clearing 6-6 at Navy. Campbell has hopes of going even higher, and he might have to beat Quantico's Bob Gardner. Gardner, who did his collegiate jumping for Ohio State, has done 6-9 plus.

V-Ball Finals On Tap Tonight

Gottlieb leaves for Europe late this month to supervise a tour of the Harlem Globetrotters. Under terms of a contract signed with the Trotters, Chamberlain will join the troupe the first week in June.

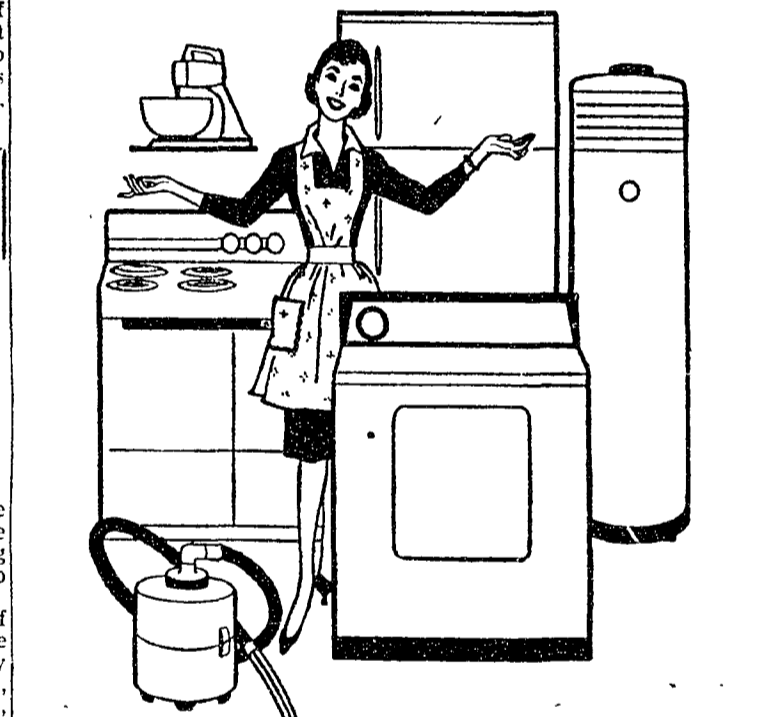
