"We thought we had the idea across to you," she told the WSGA Senators

She repeatedly emphasized that the junior resident program was not intended as a "gestapo system." "Nobody is railroading anything through," she said, "this you must believe."

Bluntly Dean Lipp stated that her office would go ahead with the program "with or without the backing of WSGA."

"Maybe WSGA is just a small group after all and doesn't represent the ideas of women students as a whole," she added.

WSGA President Margaret McPherson said the group had planned to go to the students again with a questionnaire on the new program to determine their views.

Dean Lipp, however, said she saw "no reason to have the women students views on this."

"What does the student public know about this?" she asked.

An uninformed opinion is worthless, she stated, and University students know little about the conception of community living.
