

Frick Predicts Bill Will Ruin Majors

WASHINGTON (AP) — Baseball Commissioner Ford C. Frick testified yesterday a bill proposing drastic new curbs on organized baseball would turn the major leagues into a farce.

His testimony clashed squarely with an appeal by President Branch Rickey of the fledgling Continental League to enact the bill.

Rickey pictured the bill as necessary to "remove the power of money" to control baseball. Without it, he said, his new league is at the mercy of those he pictured as monopolists ruling professional sports.

Both Frick and Rickey phrased their statements in polite enough terms.

It was Edwin C. Johnson, Colorado's former governor and former senator now a consultant to the Continental League, who threw the sharpest harpoons.

Endorsing the bill as he did so, Johnson caustically pictured Frick as subservient to the National and American league club owners whose operations Frick polices.

Frick and Johnson, an old baseball man himself, have been on friendly terms for many years. As the subcommittee recessed for lunch after Johnson had read his testimony, they

shook hands and chatted amiably.

Frick gave Johnson a playful poke in the ribs, and, within earshot of newsmen and others, said "Ed, I wouldn't take that from anyone else but you."

The exchanges marked public hearings by the Senate Antitrust and Monopoly subcommittee whose chairman, Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), is author of the disputed bill. Kefauver did not attend the hearing.

Palmer Wins Pro Award

NEW YORK (AP) — Arnold Palmer was named winner yesterday of the April award in the S. Rae Hickok pro athlete of the year poll for his stirring triumph in the Masters Golf Tournament. The pro from Ligonier, Pa., also won the March prize.

Thus he duplicated the feat of pro basketball star Wilt Chamberlain, who won in January and February.

Yanks Get A's Cerv For Carey

CHICAGO (AP) — The New York Yankees and Kansas City Athletics did it again yesterday when the Yanks traded third baseman Andy Carey to the A's for outfielder Bob Cerv, a former teammate.

It was the 16th deal between the two clubs, involving a total of 61 players, since the Philadelphia American League franchise was shifted to Kansas City in 1955.

The Yankees acquired a power hitter to fill their left field needs although he is batting only .260.

In return they gave the A's a front line third baseman who missed most of last season because of illness and was beaten out of the job by Gil McDougald in spring training. No cash was involved.

Acquisition of Cerv gave the Yankees two-thirds of the 1959 Kansas City outfield. Roger Maris, hitting .333, came to the Yanks with reserve infielders Joe DeMaestri and Kent Hadley last December for Norm Siebern, Hank Bauer, Marv Throneberry and Don Larsen.

Cerv normally plays left field. That has been a trouble spot for the Yanks ever since they traded away Gene Woodling.
