

SGA to Investigate Secret Societies

The influence of secret societies on student government and two recent scandals in politics will be the subject of an open hearing to be held by the SGA Investigating Committee at 7 p.m. tomorrow in 10 Sparks.

The meeting is open and all students have been invited to attend and present any evidence they have.

The committee, which was approved by SGA Assembly on Thursday, will deal first with the recent issues concerning secret societies. In the past few weeks Lion's Paw has been the main topic and many students have charged that LP members exert influence in campus activities especially student government.

A second topic tomorrow night will be charges made by John Brandt, former Campus party clique chairman and defeated candidate for SGA vice president. Brandt accused James "Tim" Nelligan, former University party chairman, of trying to throw the spring elections.

The third issue will also concern Brandt. The incident occurred at a Campus party meeting prior to elections. At that time James Kridel, Campus party minority leader, charged Brandt with obtaining his party chairmanship illegally.

Brandt has assumed the position early in the semester after both the chairman and vice chairman resigned. Before becoming chairman, Brandt had been party treasurer.

The investigating committee will be chaired by Lee van Bremen. Members are Edward Kohler and Elizabeth Ingley with Harold J. O'Brien, assistant dean of the College of the Liberal Arts, advising.

The committee will evaluate the information obtained at the meeting and will report to SGA Assembly.

2 Whipple's Buses May Run Today

To accommodate more passengers, two buses may run to Whipple's at each of the four scheduled times today and tomorrow, weather permitting, Phil Haines, president of the Town Independent Men's Council, said.

The buses will leave the front of the Hetzel Union at 1 p.m. and reach the following residence halls at five-minute intervals: South Halls, Nittany, North and West Halls. Buses should return to campus by 5 p.m.

Another trip will leave the HUB at 6 p.m. Two trips will be made tomorrow.

A one-way ticket costs 30 cents. Children under 12 may ride free if accompanied by a parent.

Haines said that the bus runs have been hampered by poor weather and by conflicting with Spring Week activities. He added that TIM continues to reserve the right to cancel or add runs as necessary because the buses are operated as a non-profit service.
