

Freshman Dismissed After Assault Charge

The Senate Sub-Committee on Discipline dismissed a second semester student from the university and suspended three others for assaulting another student, according to Le Roy Austin associate dean of men.

Austin said that the four students, who had been drinking at a cabin in a wooded area about 50 miles outside of State College, were responsible for a physical attack upon a student in a residence hall. Two of the students actually participated in the attack, while the other two stood by and witnessed the action, he said.

One of the second semester students who took part in the assault was immediately dismissed from the University. As a minor, the student was also guilty of violating the University regulations concerning alcoholic beverages, Austin said.

Austin also said that at the time of the assault, the student had been on suspended suspension. He had been found guilty of concealing information concerning the theft of a machine gun from the Armory which took place during the fall semester. In addition, the student was later involved in gambling activities in the residence halls, Austin said.

Two other second semester students involved in the incident were also minors and guilty of the same violations. They will be allowed to finish the semester, but have been suspended until the spring of 1961.

The fourth party involved a 21-year-old eighth semester student in engineering who admitted pur-

chasing alcoholic beverages for the other students. He will be allowed to finish the semester but has been suspended until the fall of 1961.

In other action by the committee, a sixth semester student in agriculture, was found guilty of drunken and reckless driving and giving false information concerning his identity. He will be allowed to finish the semester but has been suspended from the University for one calendar year.

In addition, the student was prohibited from possessing or operating a motor vehicle in Centre County for the remainder of the academic year.

University Budget Set For '60-'61

An estimated \$50 million will be spent by the University in operating expenses next year, William Christoffers, director of the division of accounting, said yesterday.

This is a \$5 million increase of the \$45 million budget on which the University operated this year, he said.

The money used to run the University is obtained from tuition fees, state and federal allocations and research grants awarded for individual research projects.

Last November the state allocated \$34 million to the University for the biennium which began last January. This was \$10 million less than President Eric A. Walker had requested. A new request for funds will not come before the legislature again until 1961.

The exact distribution of available funds for the next fiscal year has not been determined. According to Christoffers, each department and division submits an estimate of their financial needs to the Controllers officer. The final expenditures will then be determined and the budget submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval.

Seventeen Sororities To Rush in Fall

Seventeen sororities will be ruling upperclass women and transfers during the fall informal rush.

The sororities, not participating in the rush program are Alpha Xi Delta, Chi Omega, Delta Delta Delta, Delta Gamma, Kappa Alpha Theta and Pi Beta Phi. Those not rushing junior women are Alpha Epsilon Phi, Alpha Gamma Delta, Alpha Omicron Pi, Delta Zeta, Kappa Delta and Zeta Tau Alpha.

Registration for the fall rush will be held between 8 a. m. and 12 noon on Sept. 17 in the IFC-Panhel office. The \$2 registration fee will be required at that time.

A compulsory meeting of all rushees and open house guides will be held at 12:30 p.m. on Sept. 17 in 121 Sparks.

At this meeting the rushees will be divided into groups for open house visits and oriented in the Panhellenic rules for rushing.

Open houses will be held at 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. on Sept. 18, 24 and 25.

The new rule for chatter dates, is that refreshments may be served. These include soft drinks, coffee, tea or punch, Panhellenic Council decided.

Heavy Rainfall May Cause Widespread Flash Floods

The heavy rains that fell during the weekend created the possibility of flash flooding in many sections of Pennsylvania including Centre County.

The rains fell on ground that had been saturated by rainfall during the past three weeks and consequently the water was unable to drain into the soil. This caused streams and rivers to swell above normal level.

The overall weather pattern indicates that considerable rain will fall during this week.

Nearly six inches of rain has fallen during the past three weeks — almost twice the normal amount. If this high rate of rainfall should continue, this month will be the wettest May ever recorded in this area. The rainiest May recorded so far in the Nittany Valley occurred in 1894 when 9.45 inches fell.

The forecast is for sunny and pleasantly mild weather today with afternoon temperatures reaching the 72 degree mark.

Partly cloudy and cool weather is due tonight with a low reading of 56 degrees.

Sunny and warmer weather is in prospect for tomorrow. The high temperature should be near 82 degrees.
