

# Press Cuts Lawrence For Publicity Methods

Governor David H. Lawrence's administrative policies on public information received severe criticism at the Pennsylvania Press Conference held last weekend at the Nittany Lion Inn.

The Pennsylvania Legislative Correspondents Association reported that the 14 resident newspaper and wire-service correspondents who were polled were critical of the administration's press relations by a 2-1 margin. According to the Philadelphia Sunday Bulletin, 11 of the correspondents predicted that things will get worse in the last two years of Lawrence's term.

# Weigand Says Construction To Start Soon

Walter H. Weigand, director of the physical plant, said yesterday that the first contractors' job conference for the construction of the Education and Psychology Center and the Horticulture Building will be held Friday.

This is the initial job conference wherein the contractors will meet with the General State Authority field staff and the representatives of the University physical plant.

"After the meeting Friday, construction will be started as soon as the contractors can get the men into the field," Weigand said. A special education building facing Park Ave. has the framework completed. The new Education and Psychology Center will be constructed across from the parking lot road next to Beaver Field.

# Wing to Be Added To Recreation Hall

Future plans for the College of Physical Education include an extension of Recreation Hall, which may contain a swimming pool for men, Ernest B. McCoy, dean of the college, said last night.

McCoy announced at the college faculty meeting that the present men's swimming facility, Glennland Pool, is in poor physical condition, and may close unexpectedly at any time, making a new pool necessary. Glennland Pool has a poor filtering system and the roof is in need of repair, McCoy said.

It is expected that ground will be broken for the new wing of Rec Hall within 6 to 8 months, and although a pool is not in the present plans, it is hoped that it will soon be included, he said.

McCoy also said the ice rink may soon be completely enclosed so that it can be used

for other purposes in addition to skating.

Stadium construction for the Beaver Stadium is progressing according to schedule, McCoy said, and it will be ready for commencement exercises. It is also expected to be in complete order by the time of the first football game in the fall.

Other long-range plans include more tennis courts, made necessary by the increase in student enrollment and dressing rooms in the Nittany area for teams using Beaver Stadium.

"White Hall is extremely overcrowded with the continual influx of more girls, and a new addition is needed in order to be able to handle the extra load put on our shoulders," McCoy said.

The direction of development of Stone Valley is not known at this time, McCoy said. There are 6000 acres available for recreational facilities and opportunities are unlimited for students and alumni. Facilities in the Stone Valley area will be scheduled on the basis of educational needs first.

# Leonides To Share AIM Loss

The Leonides Council last night voted to share the loss of missing funds with AIM.

Roberta Hill, president, made the suggestion that Leonides give AIM one-fourth of the \$44.75 which was taken from the AIM office between May 7 and May 10. The council agreed on the proposal.

The council awarded shingles for outstanding work in Leonides in the last year to Carol Franke, Margaret Orchard, Patricia Pennypacker, Beverly Cades, Arlene Evangelista, Anne Farley and Joanne Taylor.

Plans were also discussed for the AIM-Leonides Encampment this fall. It is to be held on Sunday, Oct. 9, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the civil engineering cabin. Those attending will participate in one of the five workshops: social and recreation, community living, constitutional revision, finances and reorganization. The council is arranging for consultants for each of the workshops, but they have not been scheduled as yet.

In other business, Mary Jane Cases was appointed public relations manager for the coming year.
